

Former Alberton Man Will Serve In Germany With Immigration Department

Mr. Raeburn Corbett spent the week-end at his former home in Alberton where he was guest of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Corbett, and his brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Eric Corbett. He also visited with other relatives and renewed many friendships.

This is Mr. Corbett's first visit since 1945 and is one of special significance since he is at present on a tour of Canada in preparation for a term of service in Germany for the Department of Citizenship and Immigration with which he has been employed in Canada for the past eight years.

As a young man Mr. Corbett became employed with the Canadian Bank of Commerce. In 1940 he joined the R.C.A.F. from which he received his discharge in Vancouver in 1945. He went to White Rock B.C. (40 miles South of Vancouver) and became associated with the Dept. of Immigration. In 1952 he was transferred to Vancouver where he has since made his home. He is now under appointment to serve as a visa officer in Germany for the next three and a half years. He will be stationed at Karlsruhe which is situated on the Rhine in the south central portion of the country in the Black Forest area.

At the present time he and two associates, one of whom is working with him to Karlsruhe and the other to the Hague in Holland) are touring Canada for information in regard to future settlement of immigrants in Canada. The tour, which began in Ottawa early in August, will occupy fifteen weeks and will take them to a number of centres in every Province of the Dominion, Ontario and part of the Maritimes are yet to be covered.

In addition to various government offices which are visited in every centre they are gaining a wide and varied first hand knowledge of the rich resources and great industries of their native land. They have seen agriculture in all its aspects, the lumbering industry from logging operations to many finished products, coastal and inland fisheries, ship building, powerful electrical developments, oil fields and refineries.

The vast underground wealth of mines, and great industrial centres from which pour forth an almost unbelievable variety of products which include furniture, rubber goods, automobiles, machinery of all kinds, bricks, tile, insulating materials, bread cakes, pastries, clothing, pottery, glass, wire, chemicals, shoes and shoes, brushes, soap, and many others.

They have visited the aluminum plant at Arvida, newspaper offices, hospitals and institutes of learning. Thus are they being equipped in a wonderful way for the

work they will perform for Canadian Government in other lands among folk who may one day become immigrants and fellow citizens in this land which is so rich in blessing and in opportunity.

Before leaving for Germany, Mr. Corbett will be joined by his wife, who is now visiting her home in Grenfell, Saskatchewan, and their three sons, Barry, age 7; Kenneth, 5 and Norman 4.

More Travellers Enter Canada

OTTAWA, (CP)—Canada's ports of entry received 402,000 foreign and Canadian travellers entering Canada from the United States last July, an increase of nine per cent over the total of 424,700 in July, 1953.

The Bureau of Statistics reported Tuesday foreign travellers entering by rail, bus, boat and plane totalled 292,800, a boost of 11 per cent from 263,500 a year ago.

Canadian travellers returning from the U. S. were 170,100, up more than five per cent over the 161,200 last year.

17 U. S. Insurance Firms Accused Of Misleading Claims

WASHINGTON (AP)—The federal trade commission today accused 17 American companies in the health, hospital and accident insurance business of "false and misleading advertising."

Together, the 17 firms—including the four largest in the field—represent annual premium payments of more than \$300,000,000, or about one-third the total health and accident policies written on individuals in the United States.

Among those named in the complaints, which grew out of a 10-month investigation, are the Bankers Life and Casualty Co. of Chicago (the White Cross), Mutual Benefit Health and Accident Association of Omaha (Mutual of Omaha), Reserve Life Insurance Co. of Dallas, and United Insurance Co. of Chicago.

Each firm is charged with from three to five allegedly deceptive practices. Individual hearings are to be held in December, and if after these hearings, the commission finds there is basis for the charges, it may issue orders forbidding these practices in the future.

Commission chairman Edward F. Howrey said the action is aimed at false or deceptive advertising claims concerning the extent of insurance protection and benefits payable. In a statement, he added that this first broad inquiry of its kind grew out of "a flood of letters" sent by policy holders who he said complained the insurance coverage they received was not the same as advertised.
