TUESDAY

one of the leading figures in the business life of this Province, Mr. J. P. Simmonds, President of the Central Creameries Ltd., of Charlottetown, passed away suddenly in the Prince Edward Island Hospital Sunday night following a heart attack. Only a short time before he had attended church services in Trinity United Church where he was an Elder and a member of the Board of Trustees. During both Sunday services he had assisted in serving communion.

Following the seizure at his home he was taken to hospital by ambulance, but after rallying briefly under medical treatment, passed quietly away.

The "Charles A. Dunning" of the Northumberland Ferries Limited was successfully refloated Saturday afternoon after she had run aground in a heavy fog Friday. The ship had grounded on Gull Rock, near her Caribou, N.S., terminus. Efforts to get her off late Friday night and early Saturday morning resulted in failure as the sea was too rough. At high water, about 2:15 Saturday afternoon, two tugs of the Public Works Department of Pictou were successful in getting her afloat again. Just about the time the tide was high the wind pulled around to the north and started to blow hard. That brought a heavy surge of water which aided considerably the work of the tugs.

On Sunday afternoon His Honor Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse officiated at the unveiling of monuments at Freetown and Lower Bedouque to two distinguished native sons of Prince Edward Island.

Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, director of the Historic Sites and Monuments Board, presided at both functions and gave the dedication speech at the Freetown monument which has been erected to the memory of the late Jacob Gould Schurman.

The dedication speech at the monument erected at Lower Bedouque in honor of the late James Colledge Pope was given by Dr. Frank MacKinnon, principal of Prince of Wales College.

About seven o'clock Saturday morning a flash fire gutted a one-room building located off Alley Street which was occupied by Mr. Jack Linkletter. Mr. Linkletter had commenced to light the fire to get his breakfast, and to give the fire a start he used what he thought was some kerosene but which turned out to be gasoline. There was an explosion and immediately the small building was a mass of flames. He ran outside with his clothing on fire and later had to be treated at the hospital for burns on his legs. He was released immediately after the treatment. A neighbor put in a fire alarm and the Fire Department quenched the blaze before the building was destroyed but all the contents were lost.

Mrs. Benjamin Cameron of Kensington, age 56 years, was killed instantly, early Sunday evening as she walked along the highway after attending evening service at the "The Glades" Baptist Church, near Moncton, N.B. She had been visiting her daughter, Mrs. Fulton Paynter, and at the time of the

accident was accompanied by Mrs. Paynter, her son-in-law, Mr. Paynter, her granddaughter Shirley Paynter and Miss Ruby Cann of Kensington.

The family group had left the church and were returning home, walking on the left side of the road, facing the oncoming traffic, when a car driven by Mr. Curtis Davis of Middlesex, Albert County, N.B., coming from behind the group, hit Mrs. Cameron, killing her instantly.

Coroner E.D. Bourque, Shediac, N.B., decided that death was accidental and that no inquest was necessary.

It is believed that the driver of the car was blinded by the lights of the traffic and did not see the group until it was too late to avoid the fatality. The accident occurred on the road leading from the main Moncton - Petitcodiac highway into the Jordan Memorial Sanatorium.

WEDNESDAY

Friday, November 9th, the day of the Royal visit will be a civic holiday in Summerside, according to action taken at the regular monthly meeting of the Town Council held last evening. His Worship, Mayor Henry Wedge presided and all members of the Council were present.

Mayor Wedge also announced that the Town may not be able to carry out its plan to engage a special train to take all the children of the Town to Charlottetown that day to see the Royal couple. He said a letter had been sent to the C. N. R. Superintendent in Charlottetown requesting the special train and he said that no reply had been received. However it had been learned unofficially that no special train would be permitted that day. He said he was at a loss what to do because if some arrangement cannot be made a lot of children will have no opportunity of seeing them.

One of the largest crowds in many years was present last night at the annual meeting of the Queen's County Progressive Conservative Association held at the Clover Club under the chairmanship of president Reagh Bagnall.

Sitting at the table with the chairman were Mr. R. R. Bell, Provincial Leader of the party, Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, O.B.E., former leader, Mr. C. E. Foster, president of the Young Conservative Association and Mr. Frank Myers, recently elected member of the Legislature.

In addressing the big gathering Mr. Bell noted that the party's lack of success in the past election had not detracted from the interest of its supporters as attested by the highly successful meetings being held in all parts of the Island. He said it was partly due to the outstanding success gained by the national party in the by-elections this past summer.

The City Council last night suggested that the Charlottetown Board of Trade offer the Council some assistance by locating a site for the City weigh scales if they are moved from their present location as suggested by the Board.

Members of the Council said all possibilities have been explored but there had been no satisfactory alternate site had been found for the present location on the Market Square.

The Council, sitting during its regular monthly meeting, found a completely redecorated chamber to greet them. The floor outside the chamber has been covered in a light colored Marbeolcum while the Chamber walls themselves have been repainted a light blue with the woodwork done in cream. The redecoration has been done in anticipation of the forthcoming visit of Her Royal Highness Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh.

Presiding over his final regular meeting of the City Council, Mayor B. Earle MacDonald last night said farewell to the chamber in which he has sat as a Councillor or Mayor for the past twelve years.

Mayor MacDonald expressed his appreciation of the co-operation given him in the past by successive Councillors and the public in general and promised his continued interest in this city in the years to come. He was elected member of the Legislature in the last Provincial election in April and will take his seat at the special session called for later this month. His official resignation as Mayor will become effective at that time.

Following his farewell address to the Council last night Mayor MacDonald heard many congratulatory words from the members of his Council. The only member absent was Councillor E.C. Johnstone who has been out of the Province for the past week.

Pte. Leonard F. MacDougall, 22, of Prince Edward Island and Halifax, has been killed in action while serving with the Royal Canadian Regiment in Korea, according to word received by his parents Saturday.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank MacDougall, 97 Bayers Road, Halifax, received word of their son's death in a terse Ottawa telegram Sunday. No details were given.

Born in Tyne Valley, P. E. I., where he spent his early years, Pte. MacDougall came to Halifax with his parents in 1941. He attended Oxford Street School here, and later took a course in plastering at the Industrial Vocational School at the Exhibition grounds.

The latest reports from the U. S. Department of Agriculture give an estimated yield of 337,122,000 bushels as compared to 346 million bushels a month ago. It is significant that the estimated monthly yields have steadily decreased since the first announcement, Mr. Shaw added, and it is interesting to note that the recent estimate is three million bushels lower than the 340 million absorbed into domestic use in the past year.

One of the highest Jersey records made in Eastern Canada in some time has been completed by the cow Philstead Sal here—17381. Sal was bred by Harold Stead of Charlottetown, P. E. I., and she is owned and was tested by Edwin Lord of Bedouque.

Sal went on test as a junior four-year-old and in 365 days produced 14,903 lbs. of milk and 773 lbs. of fat on twice-a-day milking with an average test of 5.19 per cent.

Not only is Sal a great producer but she is a wonderful individual as well, classifying Very Good. She is a daughter of Pansy's White Aim—109166—an outstanding Jersey sire used artificially for a few years at Charlottetown and is now owned by the Fredericton Artificial Breeding Unit at Fredericton, N. B.
