Local and Other Items.

REGULAR meeting of St. Matthew's Temperance Society this evening at 8 o'clock.

THE Dorchester breach of promise case has been settled out of court. The defendant paid \$350.

MR. HENRY DAVISON has decided to contest Ward 4, and desires the votes of his friends in the Ward.

THE pay of the Ottawa police has been advanced \$5 a month—\$30 for first-class and \$45 for second.

THE clearing out sale of boots and shoes at McEachen's boot store is still going on.

FIFTY-SIX vessels, aggregating 15,095 tons were built in Maine last year; the smallest tonnage for ten years.

A BAR of gold, valued at \$3,000, was brought to Halifax a few days ago. It was the product of 140 tons of quartz.

IT is estimated that over 1,800 locomotives were built in the United States during the past year. They cost about \$15,000,000.

ARCHBISHOP TACHE has almost entirely recovered from his recent illness, and expects to leave Winnipeg for Rome in about a month.

HIS LORDSHIP THE CHIEF JUSTICE and Mr. Justice Peters have been so unwell during the past few days as to be unable to attend Court.

A ST. THOMAS, Ont., hotelkeeper escaped conviction on a charge of violation of the Scott Act, on the ground that what he had sold was St. Jacob's Oil.

THE schr. Maria, Capt. Boudrot, with a cargo of potatoes and turnips from P. E. Island, arrived at Sydney, C. B., last week, and will lay there all winter.

IT is said that applications for the purchase of between four and five thousand acres of the Canadian Pacific Railway lands about Calgary were received during December.

AT an adjourned meeting of the electors of Ward One, held last evening at the Engine House, King Street, Mr. David Small was nominated as a suitable person to represent the Ward at the City Council Board.

WE are informed that a robin was seen in Judge Young's grounds on Monday and Tuesday last week, after the thermometer had been down to 27 below zero the Sunday previous. Last year there was one seen on the 15th January.

DRIVING 1886 the immense quantity of 100,700,000 feet of Canadian lumber was shipped from Montreal, employing 181 steam and sailing vessels. In 1877, only nine years ago, but 3,450,000 feet were shipped, only ten vessels being engaged in the trade.

WE learn from the Boston Pilot that the Rev. Father Arden recently conferred the habit of the Christian Brothers on Mr. Ambrose Carey, at the Villa de la Salle Novitiate, Martinez, Cal. The novice is a native of Prince Edward Island, and about 21 years of age.

A NEW 30-lamp power dynamo was yesterday placed in the electric light station. The new engine, now being built by McKinnon & McLean, will be finished about the middle of next month. A number of nicely bronzed store lamps have recently been received, and as soon as the new dynamo is in working order they will be put in use.

THE Canadian House of Commons is tabulated in the Montreal Gazette Almanac as containing 68 lawyers and notaries, 36 merchants, 27 farmers, 17 physicians, 8 journalists, 9 lumbermen, 7 manufacturers, 5 agents, 4 contractors, 3 shipowners, 2 gentlemen, 2 engineers, 2 millowners, 1 brewer, 1 seigneur, 1 banker, 1 conveyancer, 1 accountant, and 1 educationalist, and a number of others not classified.

THE Chiefs of Police of the Maritime Provinces have received circulars, in which it is stated that the State of Nebraska will pay \$200 for the arrest and conviction of the murderer or murderers of one James Quinn. Wilhelm Sproetz, alias William Bak, is the supposed murderer. The murder was committed about 29th September, 1886, on Quinn's farm in Adams county. Sproetz is a German, about 5 feet 4 or 5 inches high; age 25 to 30 years; weight 150 to 160 pounds; light complexion, hair and moustache; bow-legged; speaks broken English.

AT the recent meeting of the Boston society for the prevention of cruelty to children, the report gave the following brief summary of the work of the society during the year:—Action was taken on 878 cases, involving 1,214 children. Besides these, several hundred old cases were re-investigated. Of the children, 894 had interperate fathers and 573 interperate mothers; 621 were orphans or half orphans; 378 had a parent in prison; 746 were placed in better homes; cases in court, 305.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] An Important Bill. WASHINGTON, Jan. 17. There was introduced in the house to-day a bill to protect American vessels against unwarrantable and unlawful discrimination in ports of British North America, and it was referred to committee on foreign affairs. The bill provides that hereafter whenever the President shall be satisfied that vessels of the United States are denied, in ports of the British provinces in North America bordering on the Atlantic ocean or in waters adjacent to the provinces, rights to which such vessels are entitled by treaty or by law of Nations, he may, by proclamation, prohibit vessels bearing the British flag and coming from such ports from entering ports in the United States, or from exercising such privileges therein as he may in his proclamation define.

A Fiendish Pair. TORONTO, Jan. 17. John Hinton and his wife were arraigned at the police court on a charge of cruelly ill-treating a child of the former by his first wife. The child is a girl 9 years of age, and the charges are of the most fiendish nature. The prisoners admitted their guilt in regard to several of the charges, and were remanded till Wednesday, when medical testimony will be taken as to the child's condition.

Protest Filed. WINNIPEG, Jan. 17. Protests have been filed against the seats of fifteen ministerialists in the Manitoba legislature, including Premier Norquay's. The seats of almost all the Opposition members will also be protested.

Cut to Pieces. ST. THOMAS, Ont., Jan. 17. N. Potter, a brakeman, fell between the cars this morning and was cut to pieces.

A Tenant Shot. DUBLIN, Jan. 17. A tenant named Kean, who had paid his rent, was shot last night in County Kerry.

Archbishop Tache. WINNIPEG, Jan. 17. Archbishop Tache has decided to leave here for Rome on Feb. 7th.

Killed by a Train. BARRIE, Ont., Jan. 17. Thos. Alford, of Beaton, was killed by a train on Saturday night.

The Names of Northwest Towns. Many have been puzzled to find the origin of some of the curious names attached to Northwest towns, rivers and lakes. An energetic contemporary in Winnipeg, the Emigrant, has recently looked into the subject with the following result:—Portage la Prairie—From the Portage (or carry) or transfer from Assiniboine River to Lake Manitoba in former days; Indian Head—From a head-like figure on one of the lakes of the district; Pilot Butte—A small hill of outlook; Rat Portage—From muskrats, a small wild animal carrying (portaging) building material; Keewatin—Chippewa Indian for north wind Keewaydin; Deception—Mirage on the lake near by; Whiteouth—White sand at river mouth; Manitou—Indian name for God, the Great Spirit; Neening—Indian for summer; Papoingee—Indian for winter; Neebish—Indian for leaf; Discotasing—Indian for to fold up; Kakabeka—Indian for a steep place; Negigon—Indian for the big lake across which eye cannot see; Kaministiquia—Indian for river of curves; Murillo—corrupted from de mouro; Savanne—(French) low land; English River—from trading posts of white men; Brule—(French) burnt ground; Wabigoon—Indian for lake of flowers; Vermillion Bay—Indian name, Red Paint Bay; from oxide of iron found there, and used as paint by them; Gleichen—(German) to equal, or be like.
