

Islanders Square Series With 8-3 Victory

Surge Ahead In Last Half Of Game Before Local Sell-Out Crowd

The Charlottetown Islanders broke out in a six goal scoring spree during the last period and a half to win the Halifax Atlantics 8-3 last night and even their best of nine final series for the Maritime Major Hockey League championship at three games each. The game was played at the Forum before a crowd of approximately 3,000 fans.

Goalkeeper Ronnie Cole, a last minute replacement for the "flubbed" Roy MacMeekin, was the victim of the Islanders' scoring outbreak. MacMeekin, the Atlantics regular goalie, accompanied the Halifax team to the Island but became ill yesterday.

Bad luck continued to dog the Halifax goaltenders as Cole was struck above the eye on a high shot by Steve Brklacich shortly after the midway mark of the second period. He was taken from the ice for medical repairs and returned about eight minutes later with five stitches in the wound.

The versatile Lyle Wiseman fired three goals to lead the Islanders to victory. Bobby Gray scored a pair, while single goals went to Walter Pawlshyn, Gary Gordon and Chuck Holdaway.

Frank Bergeron scored for Halifax in the first period while Billy Ford and Billy Watson counted in the middle frame.

The teams split two goals in the dull first period and the Islanders outscored the Atlantics 4-2 in the middle frame. The Islanders added three more in the last session but their scoring efforts were nearly overshadowed by the referee bawling antics of big Hughie Campbell.

Campbell Draws Match Misconduct Before the game ended Campbell drew misconduct and match misconduct penalties. Early in the period he dumped referee Jim Kelly over the boards into the laps of the fans as he accidentally bumped the official. He later drew a 10-minute misconduct for insulting the same official and three minutes later he struck Kelly over the head with his gloves.

He struck the official after Lyle Wiseman scored the last goal of the game. The Atlantics insisted that the goal was off-side and they had a good claim. When Kelly skated over to the score-keeper to report the goal Campbell reached out of the penalty box and struck him on the head with his glove before tossing both gloves on the ice.

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Between them they scored five goals and picked up eight points. Wiseman had four points, Gordon and Pawlshyn two each.

The Islanders controlled play throughout most of the game although the teams directed the same number of shots on the opposing net. Each team had 28 drives on net but the Islanders hitting was more accurate while Miller was tougher to beat.

Cole could not be faulted for the loss of the game. He had his team out front 3-2 before he was injured. However, the injury appeared to weaken his stopping ability and he surrendered three goals in the last half of the middle frame.

Referees Kelly and O'Donoghue handed out fourteen penalties with the Atlantics drawing nine and the Islanders five. Clements and Bergeron drew the only majors for a short but severe fist fight at centre ice in the second frame.

Bowness First Chance
Bob Bowness had the first good scoring chance of the game when he tossed a 30-footer at Al Miller around the 50-second mark.

Hub Beaudry almost succeeded in putting Marcel Clements in the clear at the 4:30 mark but Joe Le-pine got back fast to break up the play. On the return rush George McLagan checked nicely to turn back a Ford-Campbell attack.

Big Bob Bowness almost put the Atlantics ahead at the eight minute mark when he hit the goal post on a short shot. Cole in the Hal-

lifax zone and fired a cross-ice pass to Wiseman. The latter took the puck off the boards and scored on a 35-foot drive that never left the ice.

Again Ford and Bergeron combined to even the score. Following a face-off in the Islanders end Bergeron fired a backhand shot at the net. Ford, uncovered at the crease, deflected the puck under Miller's pads for the tying goal.

Miller Robs Campbell
But before Ford scored his goal Miller came up with one of the best saves of the game as he robbed Hughie Campbell with a circus catch of the big winger's 20-foot drive.

Clements and Bergeron started mixing it up in the Atlantics corner at the four minute mark. Play was stopped two seconds later when Watson tripped Hurst and drew a penalty. It was then that Bergeron and Clements began trading punches for which they drew five minute sentences.

The Islanders missed two great scoring opportunities when they had the man advantage. Shortly after Watson was released from the penalty box he broke away but Miller came out of his net to beat the clever little centre-man.

However Watson connected on the next try. He took a short pass from Hayes at centre, skated around Brklacich and backhanded a 20 footer into the top right hand corner to put the Atlantics ahead 3-2.

Four minutes later Cole was struck above the eye by Brklacich's high shot from about 30

Gray opened the scoring by drilling a rising 40 foot shot into the top right corner of the Halifax net while the Atlantics played a man short. Bowness being in the penalty box for hooking Pawlshyn.

George McLagan and Chuck Holdaway started the play with Holdaway feeding Gray the puck at centre. Bob skated over the Halifax line and as the defense faked back he blazed the rubber into the cordage.

The lead was short-lived as Frank Bergeron scored on Bill Ford's rebound about a minute and a half later. Ford picked up the puck in his own end and streaked down the right hand side.

He fired a shot that Gustavson blocked but Bergeron followed up fast to backhand a screened drive past Miller.

Walter Pawlshyn tested Cole with a low shot ten seconds after the start of the second period. The play shifted into the Islanders end and on the return rush Gustavson picked up the puck in the Halifax zone and fired a cross-ice pass to Wiseman.

The latter took the puck off the boards and scored on a 35-foot drive that never left the ice.

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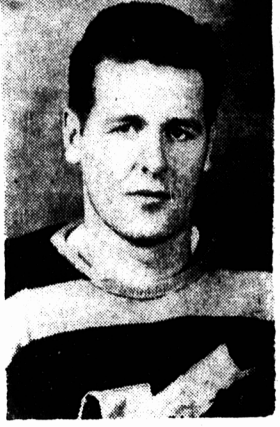
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Big Cogs In Island Win

Sugar Jim To Play In Crucial Game Tonight

BOSTON, (AP)—Montreal Canadiens needed only one more victory to clinch their first Stanley Cup triumph since 1946 Wednesday night when they and Boston Bruins left for the Canadian city for tonight's fifth game.

The Canadiens appear to have the trophy clinched, for they overwhelmed the Bruins by 3-0 and 7-3 margins here Sunday and Tuesday night.

Facing the difficult task of winning the last three games in the best-of-seven final series, the Bruins were strengthened a bit when Sugar Jim Henry, the regular goalie, assured his teammates he would be back for the fifth game.

Henry twisted an ankle in Montreal Saturday night when the Bruins won the second game to even the series. "I want to play because I'm sure it will give the team a lift," Henry said.

He had just returned to the ice after receiving medical attention when Gordon whacked Wiseman's pass-out into the lower right hand corner to tie the score.

A little more than a minute later Bob Gray fired his second goal as he snapped McLagan's rebound behind Cole. McLagan's long shot was blocked by a defenceman's leg and the puck bounced to Gray. The big right winger wasted no time in picking the open side of the cage from 25 feet out. The goal tumbled to be the winner.

Pawlshyn completed the scoring for the period by guiding Brklacich's shot from the blue line into the cage. Frank King of the Atlantics was serving a penalty at the time.

Islanders Two Men Short

The Islanders played two men short for a minute and a half as Hurst and Gustavson sat in the penalty box. The defensive combination of McLagan, Travis, Beaudry and Gordon kept the Atlantics off the score sheet.

Cole came up with a terrific stop off Pawlshyn at the 30 second mark of the third period after Wiseman put the big left winger in the clear with a short pass. A minute later King broke away and missed the net from about 20 feet out.

Wiseman scored his second goal to put the Islanders ahead 6-3 at the 5:11 mark. The goal resulted from a lovely piece of work by Gordon. Gary shoved the puck through the Halifax defense, picked it off the back boards and centered out to Wiseman who backhanded it through Cole's legs.

Carroll Bloom was sitting out a minor penalty for boarding Hurst when Chuck Holdaway ripped an angle shot into the corner of the Halifax net for the Islanders seventh goal. Whitlock put Holdaway in the clear at the Halifax blue line with a forward pass from centre-ice.

CHICAGO, (AP)—Heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano, slated to defend his title May 15 in Chicago against Jersey Joe Walcott in a bout once postponed, was pronounced physically fit Wednesday but cautioned to postpone boxing until next Tuesday.

Marciano originally had been scheduled to meet Walcott at the Chicago Stadium April 10 but the fight was postponed because of a nose injury the heavyweight champion suffered in training.

The champion's nose was examined Wednesday in the offices of the Illinois Athletic Commission and Dr. John Pribble pronounced it healed but newly healed.

Wonder Horse Of 1952 Is Retired

DUBLIN, (AP)—Tulyar, Europe's wonder horse of the 1952 season, was retired from racing Wednesday night.

The Irish National Organization, which paid the Aga Khan \$700,000 for the four-year-old colt, said he would be sent to stud.

Tulyar was unbeaten last year, including among his seven victories the Epsom Downs Derby.

Tulyar has been the centre of one of the hottest political issues in Ireland since the government-sponsored stud farm outbid all others for him a few months ago.

The horse earned \$210,684 in prizes last year to set a British record.

Fears that Tulyar might suffer an injury or even lose on an off-day—knocking down stud fees for his services—led Irish officials to bring an end to his racing days.
