## Role of Vocational School Explained to S'ide Board

SUMMERSIDE BURKAO — J. Cameron MacDonald, principal of the Prince County Vocational School last night was a guest speaker at the regular meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade.

The meeting was held in a room at the school, and the members of the board of trade were taken on a guided tour of the building by Mr. MacDonald and representatives of the firm of Williams and Murphy.

Mr. MacDonald began his talk by asking the question "Why these vocational schools?"

He said that industry today demands skills, and the skills are not available. He said Canada today is trying to build a pool of skilled labor across the country.

Mr. MacDonald said that two out of every 10 persons that went only to grade eight in school by some lucky chance by some means available to themselves an education.

Referring to the labor bodies, Mr. MacDonald said his intention "you buy them as you would nails or shoes." He said in reference to the vocational school "We are here to help educate people, and this isn't a hobby school, it's a business school."

He explained the difference between the vocational school and the industrial school, and the industrial school is the guiding light.
