### "A HUGE WINDFALL"

Mr. John F. Mellick, merchant, of Elmira, East Point, received a few days ago, a letter from a gentleman residing in East Boston, Mass., enclosing a clipping from the Boston Traveller containing the following despatch:

"HERE'S \$100,000 FOR SOMEBODY."

"NEW YORK, March 27.—Henry Mellick, 86 years old, is dead at his home near Plainfield, N. J. He was known as a miser, and leaves an estate worth at least \$100,000. If he had any relations no one in Plainfield knows of them. His farm is a valuable one, and he had a good-sized bank account in this city. No one knows whether he made a will or not, but as he had expressed a superstitious fear that if he made a will he would die it is believed he died intestate."

Mr. Mellick is satisfied that the Henry Mellick referred to in the above, was his uncle, his late father's only brother. The name, the age and general description correspond exactly. When last heard from he was in Halifax, N. S. His wife died about 26 years ago, leaving no family. He was known to be very wealthy. He left Halifax about that time, and has not been heard from since. Mr. Mellick has written to the New York papers and to his brother Rev. Henry Mellick, B. D., pastor of the Baptist Church at Emerson, Manitoba, and expects to have matters straightened out in a few weeks. There are six brothers and two sisters, and if this proves to be correct, they will have a snug sum to divided among them.

Miss Laura M. Mellick, who is about to graduate from the Charlottetown Business College, is a daughter of Mr. John Mellick. She will, no doubt, be pleased to hear of her father's good fortune.—Com.
