**WONDERFUL DANCING.**—A wonderful feat in dancing is recorded from Berlin. At a recent ball a prize of a gold ring was offered to the lady who waltzed the longest without stopping. Twelve couples competed. They began waltzing at 12:30 a. m., and it was 5:45 before the winner and her partner stopped waltzing. By 2:20 five couples dropped out and at 5:15 another lady fainted. **EIGHTY MILES AN HOUR.**—According to a London despatch the North-Eastern railroad has just completed a locomotive which, it is hoped, will soon gain the world's record. It is triple expansion, weighs eighty tons, and will drag a heavier load than any locomotive now on the rails in any country. At all events that is what the builders claim. With an ordinary passenger train no doubt is felt that it will maintain a speed of eighty miles an hour for hours at a stretch. But this engineering marvel has not yet been seen outside the the North-Eastern railroad's work at Gateshead.

**SERIOUS ACCIDENT.**—The friends of Mr. Henry Rackham, the well-known contractor and builder, will wear with regret that he met with a serious accident at New Glasgow a few days ago. It seems that while Mr. Rackham was at work on a building belonging to his brother the scaffolding upon which he was standing gave way and he fell to the ground. His collar bone was dislocated, two ribs broken and he was also injured internally. His condition is so serious that it is at present impossible to bring him to his home in Charlottetown. ### THE MAINE AVENGED.

A correspondent of Santiago writes: For hours after Admiral Cervera went aboard the Gloucester, the Infanta Maria Teresa, Almirante Oduendo and Vizcaya continued to burn, and every now and then a deep roar, accompanied by a burst of flame and smoke from the side of the ship, would announce the explosion of more ammunition or another magazine. As the flames shot higher and higher above the decks of the magnificent vessels that had composed Admiral Cervera's fleet many of those who witnessed the scene felt it had a strong connection with the destruction of the American battleship in Havana harbor five months ago. Lieutenant-Commander Wainwright, the commander of the Gloucester, was executive officer of the Maine at the time of the disaster and it was his ship that sank two Spanish torpedo boat destroyers today and afterwards received the Spanish Admiral abroad as a prisoner of war. From his position on the bridge of the Gloucester, Lieutenant-Commander Wainwright watched the flames and smoke rear through the decks of the three greatest battleships of the Spanish navy, which were soon to be reduced to nothing but shattered masts and twisted smokestacks protruding above the water, similar to that other picture in Havana harbor. It was not strange, therefore, that he remarked to his brother officer standing beside him, "The Maine is avenged."

Just then the Pluton and Furor sank. The Gloucester's boat picked up as many of the survivors as she could find on the shore. The prisoners of war included the captains of both boats. None offered any resistance, and were glad to go to the Gloucester, as they feared an attack from the Cubans. A number of survivors, including officers of the Furor, who, it was reported, had their legs shot off, were scattered along the coast for some distance and could not be found.

The most remarkable feature of the combat was the fact that, notwithstanding the utter destruction of the Spanish fleet and the hard fight those ships made even after they were on fire, the American vessels should escape without injury.
