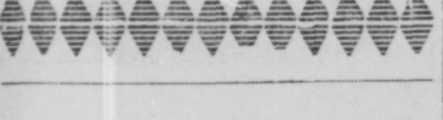

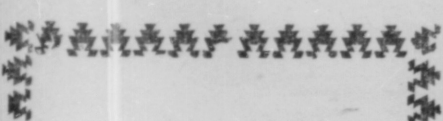

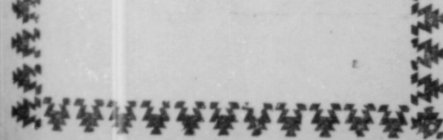

Local and Other Items.

THE STANLEY.—The Stanley crossed to Pictou this morning.

TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE.—The annual meeting of the Charlottetown Temperance Alliance will be held in the Y. M. C. A. parlour on Thursday the 13th inst. at 8 o'clock.

THE MAILS.—This morning the two lots of boats were at Cape Tormentine. Both crossed over to Cape Travers and brought altogether one hundred and ten bags of mail, which arrived in town at a quarter to twelve. One lot of boats returned to Tormentine arriving there about twelve o'clock.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—A serious accident happened yesterday at the mussel-beds on St. Peter's Bay by which Mr. Peter Murphy, carpenter, a resident of Morrell, had his wrist broken and the cap of his knee shattered. It appears that while in the act of raising mud with Mr. Kimble Webster's digger the crank slipped flying back with great force with the above result. Mr. Murphy will be laid up for months.

Dalton, of Tignish, all of whom were students at St. Dunstan's. The omission is gladly supplied, and the successful students have our congratulations.

The world at large knows little of Queen Marie Henriette (who is recovering from a severe illness), as is often the case with Sovereigns who have no part in the government of their country, and having neither marked qualities nor eccentricities. Queen Marie belongs rather to the admirable class of wisely helmsmen and mother than to the race of active rulers. Like humbler-placed mortals, she has not escaped the common burden of sorrow, but has probably had more than falls to the lot of most of us. No sons have blessed her union with King Leopold, but of her two daughters one is the widow of the unhappy Prince Rudolph of Austria, and a second, Princess Phillip of Saxe-Coburg, is now the inmate of an asylum after startling the world and saddening her relatives by a peculiarly unpleasant scandal. Of Queen Marie herself her husband's subjects say nothing but good.

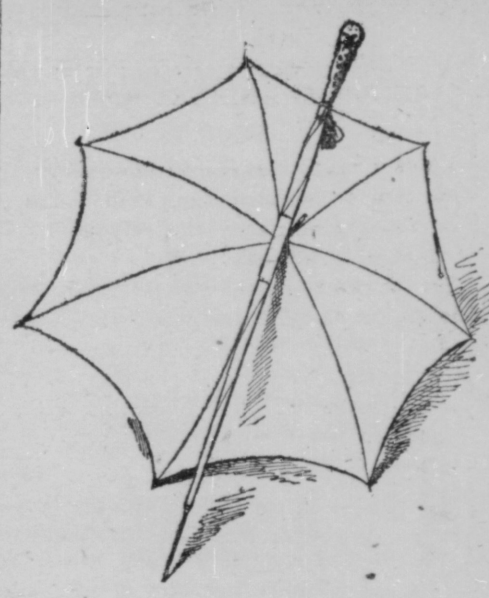
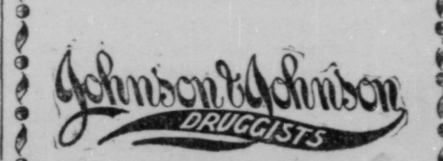
