City clerk Walter C. Peterson sent telegrams to both Stoneham and O'Malley inviting them to visit Los Angeles and inspect potential playing fields.

Jersey City Dodgers? Shades Of Flatbush!

JERSEY CITY, N. J. (AP)—Try rolling this one on your tongue: The Jersey City Dodgers.

Sounds strange, but it could happen.

A decision on whether the National League-leading Brooklyn Dodgers will play seven games in this city next season will be reached in one month.

Mayor Bernard J. Berry made the announcement Monday after a meeting with Dodgers president Walter F. O'Malley and other officials of the Brooklyn team.

O'Malley told a press conference that Dodgers are "seriously interested" in playing seven games in Jersey City.

He added: "It looks good for next year and 1957."

However, he said, Dodgers would not move permanently to Jersey City if New York condemns the necessary land for a new stadium in Brooklyn.

If the move fails, he added, they could consider moving to Queens, Long Island or Jersey City.

Mayor Berry said it would take the city some 10 days to figure out the costs of fixing up Roosevelt Stadium, where the games would be played.

The municipal-owned stadium is being used as a site for auto races and as a skating rink. It has a 24,500 seating capacity and the city is considering adding some 6,000 more seats in the outfield.

Chrysler Corporation Will Sponsor Football TV

WINDSOR, Ont. (CP)—The Chrysler Corporation of Canada has reached an agreement with the CBC to televise Canadian professional football games this season.

The agreement provides for the home city of a Big Four game to be blacked out to prevent the telecast from affecting the attendance.

The restrictions apply only to the regular scheduled league games. The Big Four play-offs will be telecast live to all cities on the CBS's network and on a delayed basis to those stations not on the hookup.

Telecasting of the Nov. 26 Grey Cup game live to eastern Canada will involve use of United States micro-wave or coaxial cable facilities since the CBS's cross-country network will not be completed until 1957.

A delayed showing of the game will show on all stations not on the network on Sunday or Monday following the Saturday game.

E. C. Row, president and general manager of the Chrysler Corporation, said the sizeable outlay for sponsorship of the telecasts will also be accompanied by an increase in the company's general advertising appropriations.

More newspaper space will be used than at any previous time in the corporation's history, he added.

NEW YORK (AP)—Light-heavyweight champion Archie Moore will give up his flying lessons until after his title fight with heavy-weight champion Rocky Marciano, Sept. 30, Julius Helfand said Tuesday.

The chairman of the state athletic commission said he gave Moore some "friendly advice" to postpone the lessons and that the fighter had agreed to the suggestion.

Helfand spoke to Moore, who is training at North Adams, Mass., by telephone not long after the 38-year-old veteran had averted an accident at the flying field at his camp.

Smith Suspended By Commission

CINCINNATI (AP)—The Cincinnati boxing and wrestling commission Tuesday suspended lightweight champion Wallace "Bud" Smith of Cincinnati "until he fulfills his obligation to box here for the Becker Athletic Club."

The Cincinnati commission is affiliated with the National Boxing Association which operates in all states except New York.

The suspension was ordered at the request of promoter Sam Becker, who said Truman Gibson, secretary of the International Boxing Club, has told him he would not be given any of the television receipts for a rematch between Smith and a former lightweight champion Jimmy Carter. Becker had announced Saturday the rematch would be held either Oct. 5 or 19.

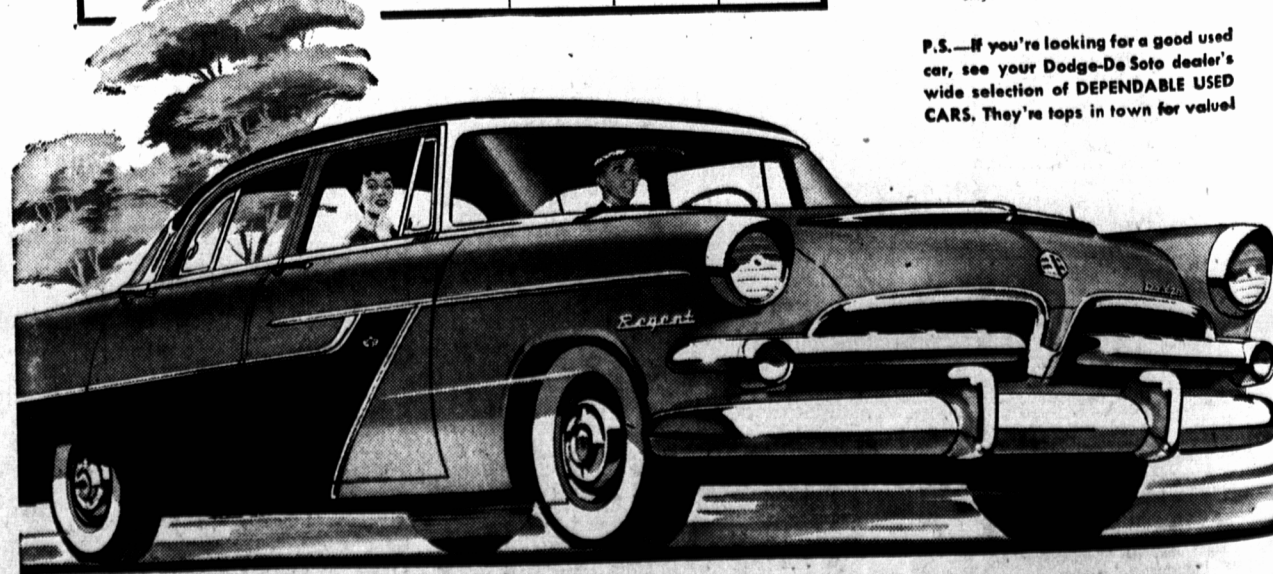
