

Thrilling 8th Dash Finish Highlights Racing Action

Racing fans at the Charlottetown Driving Park last evening saw the most thrilling finish to an eight dash card to be seen in a long time when four horses battled nose and nose down to the final wire. Avalon Frost, Elmer C., Grand R. and Conte Richeleu all hit the finish line within a split second of one another and judges scanned the photo finish for approximately twenty minutes before the order of finish was announced. This win broke up Elmer C.'s attempt to become the fourth double dash winner on the card.

Mr. Charmer, with W. Henderson up on the bike, copped both the third and seventh heats and so figured in two of the features of the evening. The brown gelding led Miss Jo Jo to the wire in the third heat, the Quinella feature, and happy holders of the right tickets picked up \$1.60 at the pay wickets. Mr. Charmer and Avalon Frost combined in the second daily double on the seventh and eighth dashes to pay \$2.50. A feature of the seventh dash was the second place finish of Bob's Girl owned by H. B. Willis of Kingston. A place ticket paid \$3.90.

RANGERS PERFORM
An enjoyable sidelight of the evening was the display put on after the third dash by the Kathleen Rangers, a band from Maine. The largest pay of the afternoon was the second daily double feature which was staged on dashes seven and eight. The winning combination was Mountain Jester and J. Orland C. A ticket on the winning twosome returned \$93.20. Other combination pays were small.

George MacLeod won his first dash at the Charlottetown park as he teamed Mountain Jester to a new record of 2:13 in winning the seventh event.

Dodgers Regain NL Lead; Maloney Has No-Hitter

Jim Maloney, Cincinnati right-hander, pitched his second 10-inning no-hitter of the season Thursday, beating Chicago Cubs 1-0 on Leo Cardenas' home run in the first game of a doubleheader.

The Cubs salvaged the split with a 5-4 victory in the nightcap.

Maloney held the New York Mets hitless for 10 innings on June 14 but lost the game in the 11th when Johnny Lewis homered.

The 25-year-old fastballer was wild, walking 10 batters and hitting another. He struck out 12 in becoming the first pitcher in baseball history to hurl two extra-inning no-hitters.

Cardenas' homer beat Larry Jackson and gave Maloney his 14th victory of the season. He has lost six.

Don Landrum's two-out two-run homer in the bottom of the ninth gave Chicago the split. Billy Williams had walloped a three-run shot in the eighth, narrowing a 4-0 Reds' lead to 4-3.

DODGERS BACK ON TOP
Los Angeles regained the National League lead by beating San Francisco 8-5 in 11 innings while St. Louis snapped Milwaukee's six-game winning streak, 5-4.

Lou Johnson's two-run homer highlighted a three-run Dodger rally in the 15th that defeated San Francisco. Tom Haller's two-out, two-run homer in the bottom of the ninth had tied it for the Giants who could have taken over the lead with a victory. Instead San Francisco remains third, 1 1/2 games behind. Milwaukee made four errors.

Caribbean Team Takes Tuna Lead

WEDGEPORT, N.S. (CP)—The Caribbean team boated two tuna Thursday to take the lead in the International Tuna Tournament of this south western Nova Scotia community. The Mexican team got the only other fish of the day.

The three big bluefin tuna began a tournament fad that ended in 1958. Not a single strike was made in that match and the competition was not resumed until this year. No strikes were made Wednesday, opening day of the 3 1/2-day match.

Louis Mowbray of Bermuda, a tournament veteran, boated the biggest fish Thursday. He took his 600-pound aboard the Cape Island boat Jean Anne in 45 minutes.

Louis Deverteuil of Barbados, fishing in his first tournament, got the other tuna for the Caribbean team. He heeded 56 minutes to get a 565-pound aboard.

Jaime Pena Vera, captain of the Mexican team, boated a 515 pound fish in an hour and 25 minutes.

The other teams in the match are Canada and the United States.

NINE BOATS FAIL
The three successful boats were trolling at Soldier's Rip, a boiling tidal stream near here. Five other boats at the rip and four at Cape St. Mary, 30 miles from here, failed to get a strike in the nine hours of fishing.

For Deverteuil, curator of a museum and aquarium, it was the biggest tuna he had ever hooked.

For Pena Vera, Mexican consul in Boston, it was his first tournament and the first tuna he had ever taken.

He said the big fish was reeled in several times before it was finally subdued. The big-

gest fish he had taken previously was a 300-pound black marlin off Mexico.

"We'll have to get a bigger one tomorrow," he said to his other team members as he watched the tuna being weighed.

In 1962, the year this columnist shot his first black duck... eleven years old at the time, the season opened on August 20th. A few years before that date it opened on Aug. 10th. The first few days in August long skeins of black ducks would weave spider patterns against a blue sky. I remember, as vividly as if it were yesterday the August afternoon, a few days before the 10th when the legal season opened, the heavy WOMP of a muzzle loader and a pall of white smoke hung over the sunset corner of the Old Home Lake. I can also visualize, as clearly as if it were yesterday, the long, black funnel of black ducks that erupted from the lake and landed on the lake barrens before getting their bearings and heading southwest for the safety of the tidal flats off Pownal and Alexandria.
