**THE SMALLPOX.**

The account of the appearance  
and spread of smallpox in West-  
moreland is reasonably sure to at-  
tract serious attention. The mis-  
fortune is that more attention was  
not given to the condition of affairs  
in Restigouche and Gloucester dur-  
ing the last few months. When the  
epidemic appeared at Campbellton a  
considerable time ago prompt and  
energetic steps were taken, and for  
the time it appeared that the trou-  
ble was overcome. But either the  
disease has been lingering all the  
while in some more remote parts  
of Restigouche and Gloucester, or  
else it has been reintroduced from  
Quebec. It was reported weeks ago  
in parts of Gloucester, and was  
known to have broken out in certain  
lumber camps. The mild type of the  
disease may have made it harder to  
recognize at first; but after it was  
known to be in the neighborhood,  
the provincial board of health and  
the local authorities should have  
exercised their full power, sparing  
neither pains or expense to arrest  
the progress of the epidemic. This  
was the more necessary if the  
people were not alive to the danger  
or if they were careless about vac-  
cination or prejudiced against it.  
It will now be a more serious matter  
to overtake the disease, not only in  
Gloucester but in Westmoreland. If  
it be true that there are some  
sixty cases extending along forty  
miles of country road, no one can  
even guess where the disease has  
been propagated. The district is  
one which is considerably travelled,  
and during the holiday period prob-  
ably some member of nearly every  
family would be at Moncton, or Dor-  
chester, or Sackville or Shediac. The  
suppression of the disease is now a  
serious task, but it must be under-  
taken and carried through.—St. John Sun.

**OFFICIALS IN P. E. ISLAND**

SOMEONE—possibly an office-seeker

the various denominations. In this  
view the exhibits of the writer of  
the pamphlet are interesting. These  
show that of the Dominion Govern-  
ment officials employed in P. E.  
Island 77 are Protestants, drawing  
salary to the amount of \$131,432,  
while but 23 are Roman Catholics  
with salaries aggregating \$44,123;  
that of the P. E. Islanders in the  
Government service at Ottawa 14  
are Protestants drawing salaries to  
the amount of \$20,820, while but 3  
are Roman Catholics with salaries  
aggregating only \$6,500; and that  
in the Administration of Justice in  
this Province there are employed 48  
Protestants whose combined salaries  
reach the sum of \$23,767, while but  
3 are Catholics drawing as salaries  
but \$4,400. These are the main  
points made by the writer. We  
have not taken the trouble to verify  
the writer's statements. But assum-  
ing that they are correct, they are  
calculated to arrest attention.

**TWO COURSES.**

In view of the smallpox scare, two  
different courses seem to be open  
to Sir Louis Davies concerning the  
experiment now being tried between  
Summerside and Cape Tormentine:  
(1) Continue the Stanley on the  
route long enough to complete the  
experiment and settle the matter  
once for all, without permitting her  
to take mails, passengers or freight  
so long as there is the slightest  
danger of importing the epidemic  
to Summerside. (2) Bring the  
Stanley down to Charlottetown  
where she can do good work in re-  
lieving the heavy pressure of freight,  
and send her back to Summerside  
as soon as it becomes difficult to  
reach Charlottetown harbor, letting  
her finish the season there,—the  
Minto going to Georgetown. The  
latter course would, in the circum-  
stances, be best for the province  
as a whole. The only real objection  
seems to be the danger of the en-  
trance of Summerside harbor being,  
in the meantime, while the Stanley  
is not running there, so filled up by  
heavy drift ice that the steamer  
will not again be able to enter it.
