### Indonesia Warns Against NATO Intervention In Row

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP)—Indonesia warned against NATO night that intervention by NATO in this government's dispute with the Netherlands would "widen the cleavage between the Western and Eastern nations."

General Sudarto Sukowidjandjo of the Indonesian foreign ministry said NATO powers should be careful not to be carried away by Dutch moves in NATO as a sign of Indonesia's claim to West New Guinea.

If the Dutch succeed in their present crisis, "the secretary-general said, 'the Afro-Asian nations will have to consider what steps they should take against the colonial powers.'"

The Indonesian opening of the NATO summit meeting in Paris, Dutch Prime Minister Willem Drees called attention to "the very serious situation in Indonesia."

Although he did not ask specifically for NATO intervention he refused to comment on the meeting.

### Alberton Harbor And Port Improvements Requested

A brief requesting that the harbor entrance to Alberton be improved so that vessels might be safely ported ashore, was presented to the Federal Authorities by the Alberton and West Prince Harbour Association.

Describing the harbour facilities as they exist today, the brief goes on to recommend an extension to the Railway Wharf to provide not only anchorage but also berthing for ships. It also recommends the construction of a landing stage in order to facilitate the unloading of fish and other cargo landings.

It is proposed that with these improvements, a fish plant could be established at Alberton which would be the largest in the West Prince fishing area, particularly that of Tignish and Mirminegash.

The brief entreats the establishing of a port at Alberton which would deliver the potatoes dock-side resulting in substantial savings to the producer.

Also included in the brief is the elimination of the approximately 800 extra freight runs made last year if Alberton were to have a shipping port. Then too the importation of fertilizer, which at present is too high transport costs, could be made at a saving to the producer. The area benefited by these improvements approximates 173,000 acres of improved land with an agricultural production of about \$2,264,000 together with a fishery valuation of \$2,379,664.

**EXPORT POSSIBILITIES**

The brief entreats a detail upon the export possibilities to New Brunswick, Gulf of St. Lawrence North shore, West, Newfoundland and Labrador by emphasizing the nearness of Alberton Harbour to each of these potential markets, which but the work should be developed by an extensive sea trade carrying foodstuffs to what are the largest manufacturing and mining areas.

It is evident, the brief states, that the expenditure required to establish port facilities at Alberton would be well warranted, and that the work should be started at the earliest possible time in order to develop and expand import and export trade for West Prince.
