That the excellent heart fit of the combined hands was not even explored!

The great mistake South made was in attempting to convey a picture of high-card strength without making the specific request that North show his suit, whatever it happened to be! The two-spade bid, following upon the opening of a lower ranking suit, did announce that South had a strong hand, but from North's point of view that strength could be confined almost exclusively to the diamond and spade suits — there was no implication that South could strongly support a heart contract.

South's logical action on the second round was to double two clubs. That double, of course, would invite North to name his suit, if any, or to pass for a penalty, if he had some club strength or, failing these possibilities, to give a non-committal preference for two diamonds.

North's six-card heart suit and spade queen would have looked fairly good opposite a double, whereas the same holding looked hopeless in the face of South's actual bidding.

**MISUSE OF THE "REVERSE"**

Too many players try to use "reverse bidding" in an artificial manner. Consider South's choice of rebids in the following hand:

South dealer.  
North-South vulnerable.

♠ Q 6 5			
♥ Q 8 5 4 3 2			
♦ 7 2			
♣ 6 5			

♠ J 10 8 4		♠ 9 2
♥ 9		♥ 10 7 6
♦ K 10 3		♦ Q 8 5 4
♣ A K Q		♣ J 10 3 2

The bidding:

South	West	North	East
1♠	2♣	Pass	Pass
2♠ (1)	Pass	Pass	Pass

South's opening diamond bid was intended to pave the way for a "reverse" in spades, but his second action was indefensible. Apparently, South felt that in announcing a "big hand," he was doing his full duty, but this was a mistaken notion! It is plain that North could not "move" over the two-spade call, and the upshot

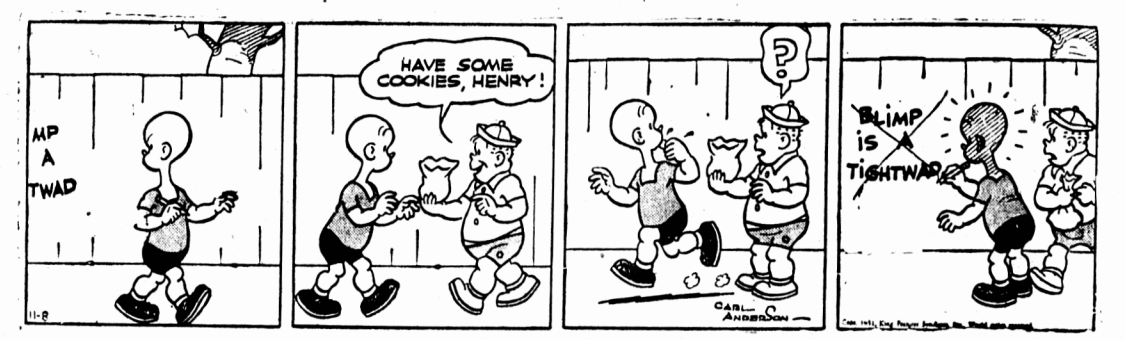

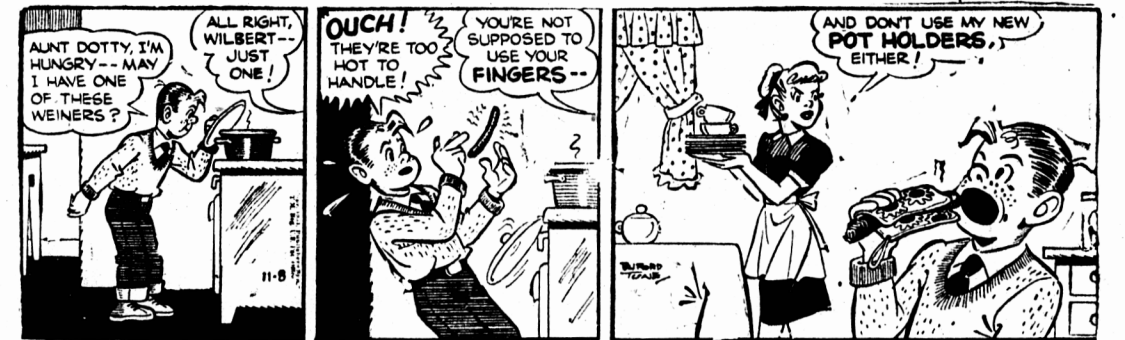

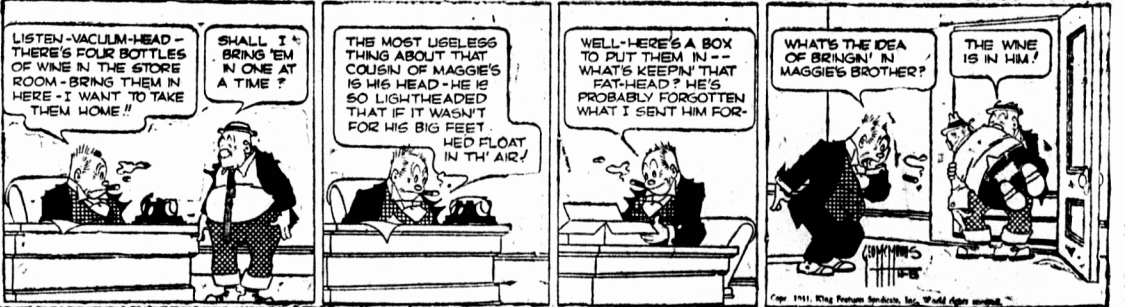
