Chile was second with 12 faults followed by Ireland with 20, the United States with 32 and Mexico, the defending champion, with 34.

He won the \$2,795 Golden Gate for 3-year-old California-breds with Sol Camp's March Away beating his stablemate. On Wednesday's card a crowd of 7,313 saw the most exciting and tightly waged battle of the meeting. They had sent Joe O'Brien and Sol Camp's Adlowayte the post as the favorite in the \$6,275 San Fernando pace for 3-year-olds. But the mules didn't scare Del Miller who was driving Mighty Jewel, owned by Armstrong Brothers of Maine. Mighty Jewel hooked Adlowayte with three-sixteenths of a mile to go and with both drivers turning in brilliant efforts Miller got Meadow Jewel to the wire in front of the favorite in 2:02 3/5. Meadow Jewel is owned by J. Elgin and C.E. Armstrong of Brampton, Ont. Later on in the program Joe won the B Trot with Butler Wym, owned by the Sol Camp Stables, and was second in the A Pace with Selka's King.

Billy states that when Faber Hanover was brought he whipped every top free-for-all at Roosevelt and Yonkers and went with only a five and a half ounce shoe in front, wore only thin boots and was a great galloped trotter.

Judo Budapest, who won the Olympic hammer throwing title at Helsinki in 1952, and Ferenc Puskas, Hungary's world-famed soccer captain, were reported killed. A later broadcast, however, reported Puskas alive and unharmed.

Money To Burn 10-1 Favorite

LONDON (AP)—Money to Burn was made a 10-1 favorite at Tuesday night's betting call-over for the mile and a furlong Cambridgehire handicap—one of the biggest betting gambles in British horse racing. Thirty-four thoroughbreds, ranging in age from 1-year-olds colts and fillies to the eight-year-old Star II, are expected to go to the post for today's race over Newmarket's turf course. Money to Burn, owned by Lady Belinda Dugdale, gets the favorite spot because he will carry only 102 pounds. Top weight Hafiz II, owned by Larry Macphail of the Glenangus Farms in Maryland, has a burden of 133 pounds.

MAHA Secretary Charlie Campbell Dies At His Home

SYDNEY (CP)—Alderman C. E. Campbell, 54, died at his home here Tuesday following a lengthy illness. Well known in Canadian amateur hockey circles, Mr. Campbell held executive positions with the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association for 16 years. He served as MAHA president from 1948 to 1951 and was appointed secretary-registrar of the association in 1950, holding the position until his death. One of the most promising hockey players developed in the Maritimes, he turned down a bid from the National Hockey League Toronto St. Pat's in 1948 to join the Royal Flying Corps. He was a native of Big Pond, N.S. and was an alderman in this city for seven years. Employed as cost accountant with the Dominion Iron and Steel Co. Ltd. here, Mr. Campbell also was a member of the city's board of school commissioners and a director of the Sydney Forum Co. Ltd.
