AGRICULTURAL.
A NEW FODDER FOR HORSES AND SHEEP.—A favorite and reliable kind of a mixture for horses is coming into use, composed of two quarts of oats, one of bran, and half a pint of flaxseed. The oats are first placed in the feed; add boiling water, then the bran, covering the mixture with an old rug, and leaving it to rest for five hours; then stir the mass well up. The bran absorbs while retaining the vapor, and the flaxseed binds the oats and bran together, agreeing quantity of flaxseed would make the preparation too oily and less relished. One level per day is sufficient; it is easily digested, and is especially adapted to young animals, adding to their volume rather than to their height; giving substance to their frame.

HOW TO TAKE CARE OF A HORSE TEAM.—The treatment of horses is an art, and where understood generally, and where understood not always practiced, so that our horses are pretty well abused animals. This is not only true of the horse, but of the cow, the pig, the sheep, and the dog. You will get from a quarter to a third more time and labour out of him, and this the same horse already practiced and broke to your hand, not needing to be renewed in the young that is to supply, prematurely his place.

A WARM BED FOR PIGS.—To make a hog profitable, you should not let him ever see a winter, and we think we have satisfied ourselves that spring pigs, well kept and nursed are far less expensive, and yield more on an return than the pig that is killed when fifteen or eighteen months old. Every observant farmer knows that if his cattle are not sheltered from cold weather and storms, they will require much more food to keep them in tolerable order than if they are kept warm and comfortable. Just so it is with pigs. If they are suffered to run over your premises in the snow and sleet, without a warm bed, they will take two piglets to equal to when they choose, they will not only, in all probability, come out with mange in the spring, but every grunt they give will convince you that all the food they have done is being thrown away, for pigs that have a cold, damp, uncomfortable bed, will get many and many pigs cannot grow. Let every one who has a mind to get a pig to get a warm bed for two pigs, the same litter, suffering the one to run as above and let the other be well-fed and well-housed and it will be found that the superior growth of the latter will pay for the care bestowed on him with good interest. Hogs that are confined, and cannot get to the earth, will frequently be benighted by having a little charcoal, soft brickbats, or soft rotten wood thrown into them, and a trifling quantity of brimstone, mixed in their food occasionally is an excellent thing.

INDIAN MAGNATES.

Russel describes some of the gorgeously dressed native princes of India who met the Prince of Wales at Calcutta. The Maharajah of Puthala, who first dashed up to the Viceroy's residence with outsiders and escort, was conducted up the steps under a golden umbrella. The Maharajah is a fine looking man of twenty-two. He speaks English, placed £100,000 at the disposal of the Government during the famine, and he rules over nearly two millions and an extent of 5,000 square miles. The state revenue exceeds £400,000. Next a salute of nineteen guns heralded the arrival of Holkar, the Maharajah of Indore. Huge in stature and bulk, dressed simply, but decorated with diamonds and emeralds of great value. Then came the Maharajah of Jodhpore, dressed in immense petticoats of many folds, reaching nearly to the ankle, gathered in by a circular roll of gold tissue from the waste. His head-dress was a small turban, bound round his brow with a golden fillet blazing with jewels. He wore a necklace of jewels of extraordinary size. Next came the Maharajah of Jeypore who has nine wives but no children. He rules over 2,000,000 people and 15,000 square miles of territory. The Maharajah of Cashmere next arrived. He and his Sir dars wore the Sikh head-dress and were ablaze with jewels. He had been with difficulty persuaded to cut down his gifts £50,000 to £5,000 in value. To all the chiefs the Prince gave gold medals of commemoration. Next from a closed brougham alighted a figure closely veiled. Beneath a robe and a close-fitting trousers pretty feet 'stole in and out.' Another figure followed. The scene before the eyes was too thick to be peered, but the Begum of Bopal saw everything. She is not 40 years of age. She seemed bowed down, but her daughter, not yet 18, walked just as feebly. It is often such women as these who rule native states. The Prince received the veiled ladies most graciously. They did not unveil, but it is said they are fair to see.

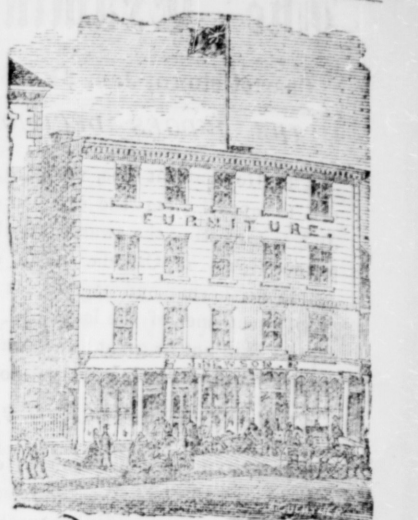
