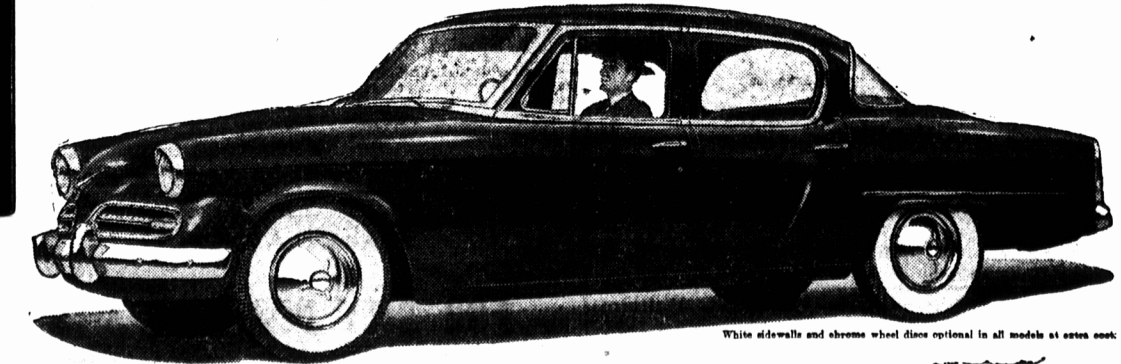

should be able to make an intelligent decision concerning the grand slam South was so obviously seeking.

Surely South's six-notrump should have received better cooperation from North. The latter had already shown an excellent heart suit and had not been raised by South; consequently, North's Q-J-10 of spades assumed extra importance. It was highly probable that the partnership's spades were more solid than the hearts; therefore North should have bid seven spades (or even seven notrump) in preference to seven hearts.
