—In 1902, newspaper headlines were made when young Dr. Emily Dunnington won an appointment to the staff of Gouverneur Hospital, downtown branch of New York's Bellevue. It was sensational news because Dr. Emily, a young and pretty girl, was New York's first woman ambulance surgeon, a woman who blazed a trail as hazardous as that crossed by the covered wagons. It was even more remarkable in view of the location of Gouverneur Hospital in the depths of the lower East Side slums. 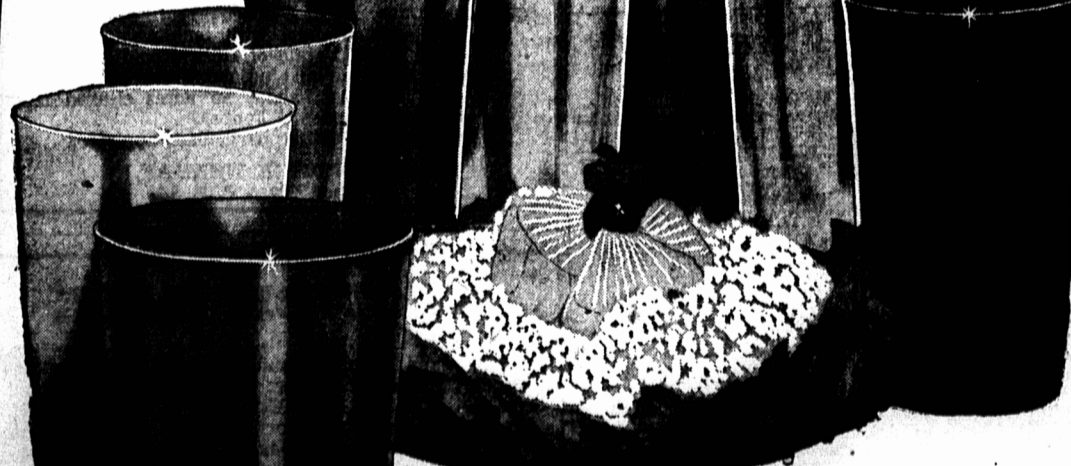
