Continue Briefing On Causeway Today

Representatives of departments of the federal government met yesterday with government officials from New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island to explain and discuss various administrative policies and techniques concerned with the construction of the Northumberland Strait causeway.

Dr. John Stewart, MP for Antigonish — Guysborough, Nova Scotia, who is the parliamentary assistant to the Hon. George Melraith, federal minister of public works, said in a brief interview yesterday that such things as labour conditions and supply, financial arrangements, taxes and other such matters were being talked out.

Hon. Mr. Melraith was chairman of the session. Representatives from the federal departments of public works, labour, manpower, revenue and justice attended the sessions. Observers from the Nova Scotia government also attended.

Today technical briefings on the actual construction and administrative procedures will be held for representatives from contracting firms who have expressed interest in bidding the causeway project.

This morning's sessions get underway at 10 a.m. and will continue until tomorrow evening.

Snakes, 'Gators And Guns Featured At Montague

Coati Mundis are not native to Montague. Neither are alligators, aramadillos, nor poisonous snakes but these animals and many others will be part of the Frank Weed Everglades Show which will be staged in the new Montague rink on Friday and Saturday nights.

Mr. Weed, a naturalist and fire arms instructor, is touring agricultural fairs and guide's meets in New Brunswick. While he has never brought the Everglades Show to this province before, Mr. Weed has appeared on CPKY television several times since his first visit to Prince Edward Island 15 years ago as a dog trainer. The show originates from Fort Lauderdale, Florida, and starts its annual tour in February, doing Sportsman's shows in the United States before coming to the Maritimes where it makes between 13 and 25 stops each season.

Most of the animals in the show come from South America, while others are native to Florida and the Southern states. Over 100 snakes will be displayed, and three of the four types of poisonous snakes in North America are handled in the show. The largest snake on show will be a nine-foot box constrictor. Mr. Weed recently played a part for a movie in Miami in which he was supposedly strangled by one of these huge snakes, and despite convincing pictures he displays of the scene he reports: "the snake died."

A 30-cage rare bird exhibit is also part of the Everglades show. Other features will be alligator wrestling, poisonous-snake milking, trick and fancy shooting with hand-guns, rifles and shot-guns, and a lecture on the various unusual animals appearing in the show.

Mr. Weed's wife, Ellen, assists in handling the animals and trains many of them at their Fort Lauderdale home. Mrs. Weed will do her own show in the United States next year. The Weeds' youngest son Gary, 18, also travels with the show and handles many of the acts. The 90-minute performance will begin at 8:30, but the doors will open at 7:30 to allow the public to see the animals and birds and the alligator pit before the actual show.
