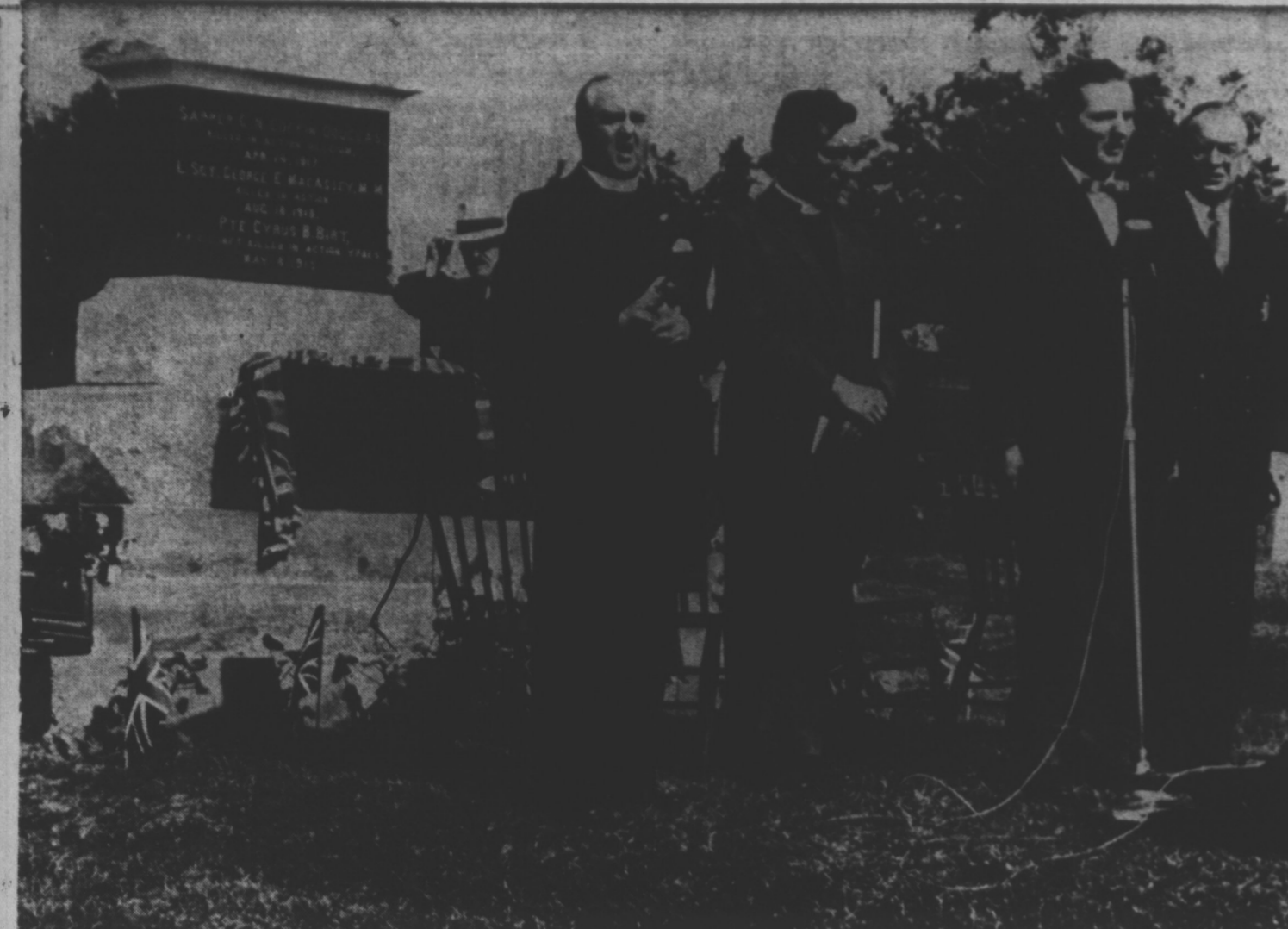

## Kensington Merchant Dies

KENSINGTON — In the sudden death which occurred in the P. E. I. Hospital on Sunday morning of Preston J. Kennedy, the town of Kensington and the province suffered a severe loss. He was a partner in the firm of P. J. and C. Kennedy, general merchants in Kensington and was the son of the late James Kennedy, one time member of the provincial legislature. He was in his 64th year.

Mr. Kennedy was a veteran of the First World War and from the time of his return from overseas he took an active part in the affairs of the town and a deep interest in the Protestant Orphanage and the Bible Society.

He was prominent in Masonic activities and was a past master of Mount Zion Lodge, in Kensington, past high priest of Prince Edward Chapter, Royal Arch Masons; at the time of his death he was three Puissant Grand Master Albert Edward Lodge of Perfection, Summerside; member of Keith Chapter, Rose Croix, Halifax; member of Nova Scotia Consistory, Halifax where he attained his 32nd degree; member of Thilae Temple, A.A.O.I.M.S. and a member of Shrine Club in Charlottetown. He was also a representative in this province of the Grand Lodge of Ireland.

He is survived by his wife, the former Daisy Orr, one son Keith with the firm; two brothers, Charles and Dr. Roy in Kensington and one sister, Marion, Mrs. Ray Stewart, Hamilton, Ont. He was predeceased by one sister Rachael and one brother Earl. The funeral will be held on Tuesday morning from his late residence.

## Trailer Damaged By Fat-Fed Fire

SUMMERSIDE — Boiling fat which ignited when it bubbled over the dish in which french fried potatoes were cooking, touched off a fire which resulted in considerable damage to a trailer at Heckbert's Park at Summerside east, on Saturday night.

During the absence of his wife and two children on a weekend visit to her parents home in New Glasgow, N.S., Sgt. Bernard Hardwick, attached to RCAF Station Summerside, had started to cook french fried potatoes in his 46 by 10 foot mobile home, and had turned away from the stove to peel an onion when the fire suddenly flared up.

Unable to cope with the flames, he was forced to flee from the trailer, and his presence of mind in closing the doors to make the trailer airtight, is credited with preventing the complete loss of the home.

## Yank Grain

gave the Americans, as well as the Canadians, a cheaper grain export route. Officials say there has been "quite a substantial movement" of grain this year from U.S. lake ports. Most of it has been corn and barley and only a limited amount wheat.

William Riddel, assistant chairman of the Canadian wheat board, told a Commons committee last week:

"Whether or not we can retain the economies of the seaway for the benefit of grain producers in the Prairie provinces depends, to a very important extent, upon the restraint which the United States authorities exercise in fixing export subsidies applicable to grain shipments through their ports on the Great Lakes."

They point to another factor which may prevent the U.S. from setting its export subsidy on Great Lakes shipments at a level to undercut the Canadian Lakehead price. This is that any such move would give ports like Duluth and Chicago a big edge over other U.S. grain ports like New York and the Gulf of Mexico ports. There would inevitably be political pressure from those ports in that event.

Canada itself sets differentials on its wheat export prices at various ports to equalize wheat shipments. For instance, in recent times ocean shipping rates from Vancouver have been lower than from the Lakehead, so the wheat board has set higher

prices at Vancouver. Before the seaway opened, U.S. grain exports did not use the St. Lawrence route. The U.S. hadn't the necessary terminal facilities on the lower St. Lawrence.

Now, however, Canada is allowing U.S. shippers to use Canadian terminals provided Canadian grain movements are not hampered.

**LARGEST IN CANADA**  
In the light of that fact, the construction of a big new terminal at Baie Comeau, Que., takes on new significance. Scheduled for completion late this fall, the terminal will be the largest in Canada, providing initially 11,000,000 bushels of new storage space. It will outrank Canada's present largest terminal, the 7,000,000-bushel one owned by Saskatchewan Pool Elevators at the Lakehead.

The car was badly damaged.

**CONTRACT AWARDED**  
OTTAWA (CP)—A \$398,214 contract was awarded to T. C. Gorman (Nova Scotia) Limited, Halifax, for construction of a breakwater at Grand Bank, Fortune Bay, Nfld., the works department announced Saturday. The new structure will consist of a 1,026-foot-long rock mound breakwater which will be 40 feet wide and 15 feet high.
