The bidding:

Opening lead—six of spades. There is a certain amount of boldness required from time to time in the play of the cards. But, on many occasions, what appears to be a hazardous play turns out, upon analysis, to be the result of a well-reasoned conclusion.

Examine the play of this hand from West's viewpoint as defender. North-South had arrived at an ambitious contract of three notrump. West led a spade and declarer won the jack with the queen.

South could count eight winners. His only possible source for a ninth trick was in hearts. So he cashed the A-K of hearts, hoping the queen would drop. When it didn't, he crossed to dummy with a diamond and led the ten of hearts, losing to the queen.

West thereupon led the king of clubs! Receiving the three from East (the strongest signal card East could spare), West continued with a club. East cashed his clubs, and South went down two.

The king of clubs play has all the appearance of being a lucky shot in the dark that it turned out as well as it did could hardly have been anticipated by West with any degree of certainty. But that the king of clubs was the correct play we would be prepared to defend to the death.

South had already been proved to have started with A-Q of spades and A-K of hearts—13 points. South could not very well have the ace of clubs in addition, because he then presumably would not have made the weak rebid of one notrump. Besides, if he had it, nothing could stop three notrump.

West, having won the queen of hearts, could count nine tricks for declarer—two spades, three hearts, and four diamonds.

To make the "safe" return of the king of spades would have been a downright concession of the contract to the declarer. West's only chance was to assume and hope that East had sufficient club strength and length to defeat the contract.

Discontent Is Heard Over Gov't Action On N.S. Coal

HALIFAX (CP)—Rumblings of discontent with government action on Nova Scotia's coal problems grew louder Friday as five big Cape Breton mines drew within a week of shut-downs.

In Sydney, members of the Cape Breton county joint expenditure board criticized the federal government for not planning to send a cabinet minister to a meeting here next Wednesday to discuss coal-mining troubles.

Councillor Angus B. MacDonald of Glace Bay said Prime Minister Diefenbaker's representatives to the meeting will be "some very junior back-benchers who don't know as much about the situation as members of this board."

Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation last week announced plans to shut down five of its Cape Breton mines Feb. 1 for at least a month. About 4,000 miners will be affected.

In New Glasgow, Clyde Nunn of Antigonish, N.S., a member of the provincial legislature, told a service club that the federal government should give bigger subsidies to Nova Scotia-produced coal. He said the mining industry last year got \$9,000,000 in subsidies while prairie farmers received \$172,000,000.

Unauthorized Commons Visit Causes Furor

OTTAWA (CP)—The action of a former Liberal MP in taking a seat in the Commons briefly was raised in the House Friday by a Progressive Conservative who said it was without precedent in Canadian or British parliamentary history.

David Gourd, 74, member for Chapeau, Que., from 1946 to 1957, slipped into the chamber for just a few seconds Thursday night, his brother said Friday in an interview.

J. O. Gou (L-Russell) said his brother "sat in one of the back-row seats (in the Liberal opposition section) for half a minute" to see if J. J. Martel (PC—Chapeau) was in the House.

The brothers said their names differently. David Gourd years ago adopted a different spelling of the family name.


The incident was brought to Speaker Roland Michener's attention by Frank McGee (PC—York Scarborough).

Mr. Michener said the matter should have been raised at the time. He added: "Of course, it would be improper for anyone not being a member of the House to enter the House without its permission."
