## Queens MP Predicts Sweep For PC's In Island Election

Making the first prediction of his political career, Heath Macquarrie, M.P., for Queen's, foresaw last night that the Conservatives would make a "clean sweep" over its opposition in the forthcoming election.

The M.P. for Queen's stated that in recent weeks it was rumored that the final results would be 25-5 for the Conservative party. "But after travelling all over the countryside, I can't find the five seats that the Liberals are going to win," he said.

Mr. Macquarrie was speaking at the large audience that was in attendance at a Young Progressive Conservative rally held at the Community Centre.

A special feature of the evening was the presentation of a charter from the National Association to Edwin MacRae, president of the Prince Edward Island YPC Association.

Other speakers at the meeting included, Bennett Carr, J. David Stewart, and Alban Farmer, candidates for Fifth Queen's; and Robert Coates, M.P., Cumberland County, N.S.

The entertainment portion of the program was chaired by Les Alexander. Mr. Alexander also conducted his orchestra which supplied the music for the dance which followed the meeting.

Mr. Coates urged every man, woman and child to take an active interest in politics and noted that the young people of Canada have undertaken a new role judging from the results of the 1957 election which put 35 men under 40 years of age in the House of Commons.

## Conservatively Speaking

Great things are in store for the various municipalities of the Province following the election of a Conservative government on September 1. First and foremost, the PC party promises to immediately create a department of municipal affairs. Under a responsible minister this department will co-ordinate and promote many new municipal improvements that will be initiated.

What a difference to the treatment accorded the municipal governments under the Matheson regime which thought nothing of tossing out proposed municipal legislation simply because it failed to meet every minor technical requirement! With the assured election of the provincial Conservative team, the municipalities of the Province are guaranteed a fair hearing in the House. Elimination of those who thrive on discord will result in better rural-urban relations.

As a concrete example of the new deal the provincial towns can expect from a friendly government, Farmer and Stewart promise their constituents that they will take immediate steps to re-vitalize the ship re-fit industry and restore public transportation facilities to Rocky Point.

Labor is also guaranteed a new deal under a provincial PC government. Rushing through a few pieces of labor legislation in the dying moments of the last session of the House didn't fool anybody—the working men and women of Charlottetown least of all. They say that their situation is exactly the same as it has ever been.

As one well known Charlottetown worker said the other day, "Wouldn't it be extremely foolish for us to vote Liberal at this time and possibly cut ourselves off from the big jobs that are bound to result from the co-operation of two friendly governments."

With no public meetings called in the first two weeks of the campaign, people are beginning to think that the Liberal candidates are afraid to face the public. But then, folks, when you have nothing to say, why hire a hall?

Yes, sir, Mr. Macquarrie! The wisdom of the people IS profound. Did you see the recent headline in our local papers? It said "PC popularity rising all over nation according to Gallup Poll." This seems to confirm what pollsters say they are finding locally—55 per cent of the electorate now favor the PC party. But, party workers think this figure too low. They estimate that the popular vote here may run as high as 60 per cent in favor of the Conservatives.

Party leader W. R. Shaw speaks in Crapaud tonight. Plenty of fireworks is expected, so plan to attend. Those unable to be there should tune in CFCY TV from 10:00 to 10:30 p.m. for a panel discussion on provincial issues. Under the chairmanship of Dr. J. A. MacMillan of Charlottetown, the panel will feature three other well-known Island speakers—W. R. Shaw, Dr. L. G. Dewar, and Dr. Hubert MacNeill.

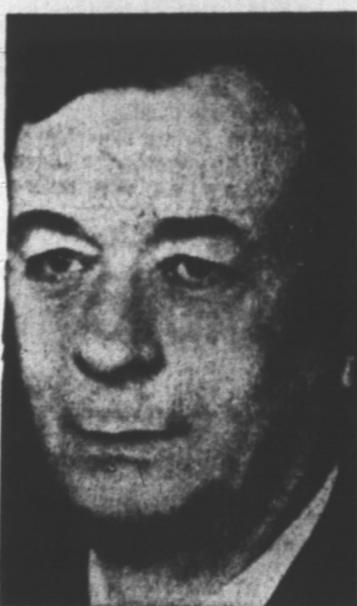
