Pilots Group Asks Ban On Trip Insurance Sale

OTTAWA (CP)—Sale of trip insurance at airports should be banned to stop the "horrible method" of murder or suicide by aircraft sabotage, a pilots group told a Commons committee.

The Canadian Air Line Pilots Association presented a brief to the Commons committee on justice and legal affairs detailing 11 crashes since 1946 which it said represent "the majority of the 18 known or suspected" cases of aircraft sabotage.

"Eight of the 11 definitely involved air travel insurance," the brief added.

Two of the crashes detailed were in Canada.

The first was in 1946 near Quebec City. Albert Guay was subsequently convicted and executed for planting a bomb on the plane to kill his wife.

The other was a crash near 100 Mile House, B.C., in 1965 of a CPA plane after an explosion that blew off the tail. There has been intensive investigation but no charges have as yet resulted.

Changes In Education Are Forecast

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—The Canadian education system will be revamped within the next 10 years because of need for more individual attention in schools, predicts an official of the Canadian Scholarship Foundation.

The foundation vice-president, Arthur V. Piggot of Toronto, also said in an interview here that more adult education is needed.

As for the possibility of free education as instituted at Newfoundland's Memorial University, Mr. Piggot said it "won't happen in the rest of Canada for at least two more generations."

ELIMINATE ALL SALES

P. C. Hamilton, president of a group that represents 1,100 pilots on five scheduled Canadian carriers, said the pilots want to see all sales of trip insurance at airports eliminated.

This included both coin-operated vending machines and counter operations where information is taken down by a clerk.

Air travel had become commonplace and safer than some forms of transport.

But railway and bus terminals didn't install trip insurance machines or counters.

"And gas stations don't sell highway insurance," added Erik Nielsen (PC-Yukon), a private pilot.

Mr. Hamilton said the pilots aren't trying to prevent people from buying travel insurance. But they should do it through regular agents who would be sure to make checks into the purchaser's background.

Discussion was on a motion made by Ron Basford (L-Vancouver-Burrard) in the Commons that the government consider banning insurance vending machines.

 Earlier, the committee heard from transport department officials.

Deputy Minister J. R. Baldwin said his department is neither "strongly for nor strongly against" insurance sales at the airports. It had

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
