The September meeting was held at the home of Mrs. Bernard Doyle, with a large attendance. The president opened the meeting with prayer.

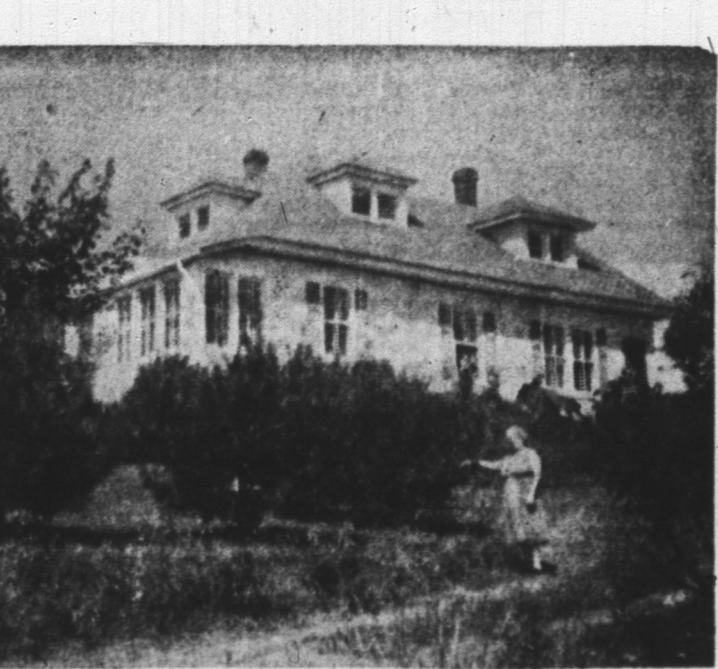
