SCHOOL UNIT NO. 1

To All Persons Qualified To Vote At School Meetings:

Take notice that for the purpose of electing TWO TRUSTEES for School Unit No. 1—One Trustee to each Polling Division—a poll will be held on Wednesday, the tenth day of June, 1953 from 12 o'clock noon to 9 P.M.

POLLING DIVISION NO. 1—Is defined as that portion of School Unit No. 1 formerly known as the school districts of Spring Park and Parkdale.

POLLING DIVISION NO. 2—Is defined as that portion of School Unit No. 1 outside the former school districts of Spring Park and Parkdale.

Nominations of candidates for election to the Board of Trustees shall be filed with the Secretary at any time up until 4 o'clock in the afternoon of May 30, 1953. Each nomination shall be signed by at least two sponsors who are ratepayers in the Unit. The candidate must be a ratepayer resident in the Division and, unless such candidate is a parent ratepayer his or her nomination paper must be signed by at least one parent ratepayer.

Poll Tax For Women Approved

TORONTO, (CP)—The Ontario Federation of Mayors and Reeves Thursday approved imposing a poll tax on females between the ages of 21 and 60 who are not entered on assessment rolls.

Alderman Ada Pritchard of Hamilton said she would favor the move if and when women are given equal pay and equal rights with men. Reeve Dorothy Hague of Swansea opposed the resolution.

Reeve A. G. Briggs of Stamford Township said women, earning in many cases as much as men, should be prepared to accept a poll tax.

Mayor A. G. Norris of Mimico said women are asking for equal rights and "this would be one way of giving them their request."

ST. STEPHEN, N. B. (CP)—The body of Melvin Hovey, 71, missing from his home at Carouse since mid-April, was found Wednesday in woods on the outskirts of St. Stephen. Death was pronounced due to exposure and no inquest will be held. Hovey was a retired woodsman.

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become less severe or disappear within an hour after injection. Unfortunately, it cannot be used too often without harm, but can be given once or twice a week to healthy patients.

Physicians treating migraine have found that patients do best who lie down immediately after beginning of headache, preferably in a darkened, quiet room. An ice cap to the painful part of the head and a heating pad or hot water bottle to the abdomen or feet are helpful. As nausea is often an accompanying symptom, sodium amylal, 0.2 gm. helps reduce nausea and promotes needed rest.

It is meeting life with attitudes that produce worry, fear, tension, resentment, rage, exhaustion together with too much ambition, that brings on migraine headaches. Dr. Marcussen and Wolff suggest cutting down on the number of things ordinarily done in a day. "The patient must learn to be less fussy about minor details." Most migraine sufferers are "perfectionists."

Other suggestions are (a) not less than eight hours sleep every night and a half hour's rest after lunch, (b) a warm bath when tired and tense, (c) an evening walk, (d) avoid needless worry, (e) don't expect perfection from others.

BRICK VENEER
The GYPROC Sheathing is covered with building paper. A 24" x 16" air space is formed between brick veneer and building paper. Galvanized brick ties are nailed through the Sheathing into studs of every fifth course of brickwork.



REINFORCED STUCCO
Crystallite Reinforcement is erected horizontally with self-furring crimps in contact with building paper. All horizontal and joints are lapped at least 2". Additional 12" angle strips are erected vertically at all external corners.



WOOD SIDING
Wood siding is nailed through the Sheathing into every stud. End joints of siding are located over studs, with double studs at sides of openings and at corners to allow solid siding for trim and ends at sills.
