**Criminal Code Section Is Criticized By Court**

**OTTAWA (CP)**—A section of the Criminal Code dealing with drunken drivers came under criticism in the Supreme Court of Canada.

Section 223 of the code says intoxicated persons in care and control of a motor vehicle—whether it is moving or not—are guilty of drunken driving.

Lawyer Robert Carleton of Ottawa argued that Parliament in enacting the code did not mean to include vehicles which pose no danger to the public.

He said this would include cars unable to move because of mechanical trouble, cars stuck in mud or snow or immobilized for some other reason.

Mr. Carleton presented the argument in asking the court to hear an appeal by Raymond Saunders of Herbert, Sask., against his conviction of impaired driving.

The court reserved decision. Saunders was charged by the RCMP after they found him asleep behind the wheel of a car in a ditch beside a highway. The car had to be taken from the ditch by a tow truck.

Magistrate C. W. Vause found Saunders was intoxicated at the time of his arrest and that he had care and control of the car. But he acquitted Saunders because the car was in the ditch and not a danger to the public as contemplated by the Criminal Code.

Judge R. M. Balfour of the Saskatchewan Court of Queen's bench reversed the decision, finding that Saunders' car did fall within the meaning of the code.

His ruling was upheld by the provincial Appeal Court and Saunders' lawyers then took the matter to the Supreme Court of Canada.

Mr. Carleton said there have been conflicting decisions on this point by various courts in several provinces. It was an

**Nuclear Arm Breakthrough Said Possible By Americans**

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—The Atomic Energy Commission has disclosed the United States may be close to significant breakthroughs in enhancing the powers of American nuclear-tipped intercontinental missiles to penetrate an enemy's anti-missile defences.

It did so in a report saying also that:

1. The U.S. already leads the world in the "nuclear defence" field.
2. Improved nuclear weapons of various types including "demolition munitions" such as atomic land-mines were added last year to the stockpile.
3. U.S. nuclear weapons are working toward developing even more advanced types.

The AEC's annual report to the U.S. Congress did not specifically describe the last.

But apparently they entail still further progress towards assuring that American missiles—launched at an enemy country after an attack on the United States—would at least partially be able to foil, decoy and penetrate enemy counter-measures—including their own missiles and ground-based electronic detection devices.

**IS LESS VULNERABLE**

The AEC put it this way: "A major weapons development objective has been the improvement of the penetration capability of strategic missile warheads by further decreasing warhead vulnerability to advanced enemy anti-ballistic missile counter-measures."

Laboratory computations and experiments have identified several possible designs toward achieving these improvements. The designs are under further study, with the purpose of producing... a system of hardness balanced against all possible threats.

"Hardness" does not refer to the mere metallic hardness of a warhead.

The AEC made plain the latest concepts already have been at least partially tested in underground nuclear weapons tests at the Nevada proving grounds.

**SEES BLEAK FUTURE**

**TORONTO (CP)**—A York University official says urban families with income of less than \$4,000 a year cannot hope to be part of the affluent society. Timothy Reid, co-ordinator of secondary school affairs, told a Unitarian fellowship meeting here Sunday that in the imminent age of automation, "few if any" persons who have no more than grade eight education will be able to break out of the poverty bracket.

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**Albertans Being Asked To Put Savings To Work**

**EDMONTON (CP)**—Albertans are being asked to put their savings to work.

The Social Credit government has set up an agency named the Alberta Investment Fund Corporation to take citizens' savings and make them profitable by investing them.

Citizens will participate by buying investment certificates from the fund with face values of \$100 or multiples of \$100. The certificates are redeemable at any time for their face values.

Participation is not limited to Albertans, but F. G. Stewart, deputy provincial treasurer and an officer of the fund, said the bulk of the investment certificates will go to people living in the province.

"All the sales people are Albertans and they are being asked to pretty well confine their sales to people in the province."

**WILL ISSUE \$10,000,000**

The investment fund will be issuing its first \$10,000,000 worth of investment certificates Feb. 15. No difficulty is expected in selling all of the first issue, but officials have no idea how many future issues will be possible.

"We know people have sav-

ings," Mr. Stewart said, "but of course we're not sure how much of them we can attract."

Investors will get at least 3½ per cent annually on their investment certificates—the government guarantees that much. The twice-yearly dividends may total more than 3½ per cent a year if the securities that the investment fund purchase prove very profitable.

Mr. Stewart said no decision has been made on how much of any profits over 3½ per cent will be returned to individual investors and how much will be re-invested.

The fund is designed not only to get savings into circulation but to provide a source of capital, especially for new or expanding commercial and industrial enterprises in Alberta.

Thus government regulations say no more than 25 per cent of the total fund will be invested in established business or industry while up to 50 per cent will go to new or expanding enterprises in the province.

**INVEST IN BONDS**

Other investment will be in bonds, debentures or securities issued by governments or approved Alberta hospitals and in first mortgages on industrial, commercial and residential property in Alberta.

Choosing the government securities—or established businesses in which to invest will be a relatively simple matter, but for new and expanding businesses there will have to be some standards before the fund can commit its money.

A committee now is drawing up these standards.

There is no limit on the number or value of investment certificates any individual can purchase because officials expect there'll be enough investment opportunity for anyone wanting it.

The investment certificates can be transferred from one owner to another.

**PASSED IN 1964**

Legislation to set up an investment fund first was passed in 1964, but it was repealed and replaced in 1965 before the fund was set up. The new act of 1965 differs largely in technical respects from the 1964 one.

B. L. Robinson, a retired banker, is president of the fund. Other officers are Mr. Stewart, C. F. MacLachlan, a building contractor, L. C. Leitch, professor of finance at the University of Alberta, C. C. Davey, superintendent of the government's treasury branches, J. W. McDiarmid, a retired bank manager, and K. J. Hawkins, former deputy provincial treasurer.

All the officers are from Edmonton, where the fund has its head office, staffed by three employees.

Fund officers who aren't civil servants are paid a per diem allowance.

**General Motors Corp. Shows Record Profits Last Year**

**NEW YORK (AP)**—General Motors Corp. has reported record 1965 net profits of \$2,126,000,000—a 23-per-cent increase over the company's previous record high in 1964 and the greatest ever reported by any corporation.

Sales of the No. 1 auto-maker in the U.S. jumped 22 per cent to a record \$20,700,000,000.

Per-share earnings amounted to \$7.41, compared with \$6.05 for 1964. General Motor's 1964 earnings totalled \$1,735,000,000 and its sales that year, \$17,000,000,000.

General Motors, the world's largest manufacturing enterprise, also logged record dividends paid per share, total dividends, payroll, employment and unit sales of cars and trucks worldwide.

The company sold a total of 7,278,000 cars and trucks worldwide in 1965, compared with 6,114,000 in 1964, the previous record total.

Dividends a share of common stock totalled \$5.25 for the year, compared with \$4.45 in 1964. World-wide payroll climbed to \$5,400,000,000 from \$4,600,000,000 the previous year. Employment rose from 661,000 worldwide in 1964 to 734,600 in 1965.

The company said net income for the October-December quarter was a record \$597,000,000 or \$2.05 a share. Sales for the final quarter totalled \$5,700,000,000.

The company said it provided for a total of \$1,960,000,000 in U.S. and foreign income taxes, compared with \$1,540,000,000 in 1964.
