

Entry Of Britain Into ECM Declared Not Painless Move

LONDON (CP) — The European Common Market is not a "painless" move which Britain can join painlessly whenever she feels like it, Premier Georges Pompidou of France said recently.

Having failed and sacrificed to build the market, the six current members cannot be expected to welcome Britain without any conditions, the premier told a press conference while his foreign minister, Maurice Chevalier de Merville sat unsmilingly at his side.

Pompidou said he had explained France's views in detail to British Prime Minister Wilson during their talks in Downing Street.

Pompidou stressed that "nothing is less accurate" than to speak of a French veto on British entry to the market. On the contrary, France would welcome British entry and would work with the other five members to make it possible.

France had vetoed Britain's

to European problems that the Atlantic alliance is not at stake despite France's withdrawal from NATO's integrated military command and that talks on the Viet Nam crisis cannot really be considered feasible in the present climate.

WILL BUILD TUNNEL

The communiqué also announced a decision to build a tunnel under the 21-mile-wide English Channel to link the two countries.

It said that subject to finding a solution for the construction work on mutually acceptable terms, the two governments have reached a decision that the tunnel should be built.

The two leaders also confirmed their intention of proceeding with fulfilment of the joint superconductor, air-liner program while maintaining constant scrutiny of its financial aspects.

On Viet Nam, Pompidou and Wilson expressed "very keen preoccupation over the grave situation."

"They agreed that the settlement can only be reached through negotiations on the basis of the independence of Viet Nam and non-interference in its internal affairs, in conformity with the 1954 Geneva agreements," the communiqué declared.

On East West relations, the two governments agreed that a new relationship between the countries of the East and the West is beginning to develop in Europe, with a general tendency toward a détente.

"They agreed that this was a satisfactory process which should, therefore, be encouraged."

Labor Minister Cited For Post

TORONTO (CP) — The Globe and Mail says Labor Minister Leslie Rowntree of Ontario will probably get the new cabinet portfolio of minister of financial and commercial affairs created during the last session by Premier John Roberts.

The newspaper says the change will likely trigger three or four other cabinet appointments to make use of some of the younger backbenchers in the Progressive Conservative government.

POLICE VIGILANT
Police reported a quiet Saturday. But strengthened patrols were maintained Sunday in case of repetition of teen-age outbreaks which occurred during the pre-stampede weekend last year.

Several youths were charged with causing disturbances after an outbreak last year on the Sunday before the stampede opening. Hundreds of youths milled around downtown streets.

Senator Naves, clad in a fringed buckskin coat and plum-colored cowboy hat, promised guests at his southeast Calgary farm the sillabub would "make old ladies young and old men tired."

Guests at the egg-and-sausage breakfast included Resources Minister Peplin and many of the Caribbean parliamentarians attending the stampede after the Canada Caribbean conference at Ottawa.

Sunny weather and temperatures in the 70s were forecast for the parade. Crowds were expected to start filling the parade route at about 8 a.m. Some 180,000 watched the 1965 parade.

The stampede this year salutes the oil industry and \$30,000,000 in oil field equipment has been placed on the stampede grounds for the first Canadian petroleum exposition.

Senator Kennedy, who Saturday watched part of an exhibition football game in which Calgary Stampede's downed Edmonton Eskimos 13-7, is scheduled to return to Washington after opening the stampede.

The exhibition drew 359,000 visitors last year. Starting next year, the stampede will run for nine days.

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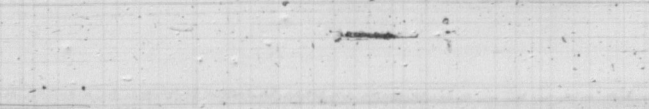
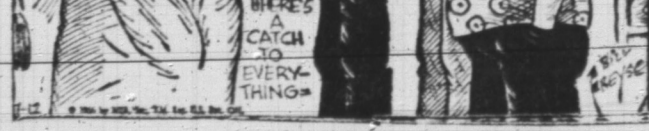

The bidding:

Opening lead - five of spades. The bidding often helps declarer to determine his best course of play. Here is an unusual case from a team of four match which illustrates how the bidding can affect the play.

At the first table, South became declarer a three notrump and West led a spade. Declarer took the king with the a c c and played three rounds of clubs in force out the ace. East returned the nine of spades, covered by the ten, and West made the pro-

per-maneuver of letting South win with the ten. With eight tricks now available, declarer cashed the remaining clubs, and played a low heart.

Had East followed low, South would have been home, but East went up with the ace, returned a spade, and the outcome was that declarer went down one.

At the second table, on similar bidding, West also led his fourth best spade. But here, when East produced the king, South decided to duck, playing the ten on the king. East returned the nine, covered by the jack and queen, and West then played another spade to force out the ace.

West's spades thus became established, but since he had no entry card, South made three notrump after East had scored his two aces. The only tricks South lost were two spades, a club and a heart.

The hand demonstrates an unusual play by declarer. South isolated the one outstanding menace to the contract, West's long spades. The proper play was not really hard to figure out, since it was virtually certain from the bidding that East had the two missing aces for his double. The duck was simply a matter of protecting adequately against an incident danger, the hard part was to think of it.
