Davison an equal number of points for the Artillery. NORTH RIVER NOTES. (By our special correspondent.) The grass in this vicinity promises to be hay in the near future of a very excellent texture. The crops generally present a fine appearance, and the farmers are looking forward to a bountiful return for their labors. The potato bug has arrived, and evidently intend to stay. You can see him roosting along the fences as you pass by, at peace with himself and the world generally. The fruit crop promises to be a very generous one, with the exception of strawberries, which are, I regret to say, beautifully and richly scarce. One of the most beautiful places in this part of the country is the farm of Mrs. Feiger, now known as Pleasant Point, but formerly as the Deane property. It is about two miles from the Howland point by water, and four by road from Charlottetown. It commands a magnificent view of the harbor, and the facilities for bathing, fishing, etc., are unequalled. One of the institutions here is a Mayflower Division, Sons of Temperance. It is said that the increasing drunkenness in this section and the disgraceful brawl last autumn at the house of Mr. Peter Gallant were the principal causes that led to its birth. It was duly organized by Mr. W. H. Harris, of Charlottetown, and commenced with a membership of forty-seven, and the number has been steadily increasing. The marked sobriety of the people here is one of the greatest proofs of the good work it is doing. A church or hall of some description is badly needed here. Boys and girls wander about on Sundays without receiving any religious instruction and of course throughout the week days are taught nothing in our common school. It certainly does not reflect credit on the people who have children growing up around them that such a state of affairs should be allowed to exist.
