NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADIAN.

MONTREAL, Aug. 28.

The contracts for steel rails given out by the Dominion Government, chiefly for next years delivery are understood to be to Barrow Company, 30,000 tons; to John Wallace & Co., London, and Drummond Bros. & Co., Montreal, associated with Brown, Bailey & Dixon, Sheffield, 15,000 tons; Guest & Co., Dowlais, 10,000 tons, and the West Cumberland Co., 5,000 tons. The prices range from \$4,000 to \$4,000 delivered at Montague.

The action of the lady shareholder of the Consolidated Bank at the meeting yesterday, in urging criminal proceedings against the President, Sir Francis Hincks, the directors and managers of the institution, is considered plucky and the report of the speeches, as published to-day, shew that the ladies gave some wholesome criticism.

UNITED STATES.

SCRANTON, Pa., Aug. 28.

This afternoon a locomotive belonging to the Lackawadpa Iron and Coal Company jumped from the track and was precipitated over an embankment of fifteen feet. John Blackwood, the chief engineer of the company, and Daniel Vaughan, brakeman, were killed, and several others injured.

FORT THOMAS, Arizona, Aug. 28.

Hines, a deputy constable, was killed here yesterday while trying to arrest J. B. Collins, a merchant. A party of nine men from Safford have Collins, his clerk, and Justice Mann in custody, and fears are entertained for their safety.

BALTIMORE, Md., Aug. 28.

Farmer Redifer, of Hartford county, was murdered this evening near Perrymanville, it is supposed by tramps. The murderers escaped.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Aug. 28.

About two acres of gardens and nurseries at Mill Hollow, near here, sank eight feet yesterday. It is believed the entire surface is undermined and must go down, destroying many public and private buildings.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Aug. 28.

Gen. J. B. Hood and his daughter Lydia are both down with yellow fever. The bark "Black Prince," from Havana, has arrived at quarantine with several cases of yellow fever on board. There has been one death on board the vessel.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28.

The physicians still report Kalloch improving, but he cannot be considered out of danger. At present the most unfavorable symptom in his case is the feeling of sickness at the stomach about six o'clock every evening.

Kalloch fears that it is produced by agitation of his nerves, occasioned by the presence of physicians at about that time, and they have accordingly decided to see him only in the forenoon. It is also thought it may result from over nourishment.

EUROPEAN.

BERLIN, Aug. 28.

The Grand Duke Vladimir and Alexis of Russia visited the Emperor William at Potsdam, yesterday. The tone of the German Official press is less irritated against Russia during the last two days.

VIENNA, Aug. 28.

The arrival of the Emperor Francis Joseph at Prague, is regarded as a favorable omen for the acknowledgement of the equality of the Czechs.

LONDON, Aug. 28.

A Yokohama despatch of August 25th says the steamer Nordenkjold, supposed to be the storeship for Nordenkjold Arctic expedition has been lost. Crew saved.

HAVANA, Aug. 28.

The minister of Colonies telegraphed to the Island Government that a treaty of peace is signed between Spain, Peru and Bolivia.

The new treaty between Germany and Japan guarantees the free exercise of religious observances and permits free access to the interior of the latter's country by colonists.

LONDON, Aug. 28.

Renewed floods are reported in various parts of England and Wales. The reports are that the harvests are most deplorable. At several places there has been thirty hours' continuous rain.

BUCHAREST, Aug. 28.

The weather continues dry and hot. There is little hopes of any improvement in the corn in Roumania and Bulgaria.

PARIS, Aug. 28.

The republicans of Bordeaux resented the presence of King Alfonso at Arcachon by placarding the town with insulting references to the King. The police tore them down and inquiry is instituted.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 28.

The Porte refused to indemnify Servia for losses from Albanian raids.

It is believed in Government circles that after a solution of the Greek question England and France will assist the Porte to launch a new loan.

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 28.

The steamer "Helvetia," which sailed from Liverpool yesterday for New York, took eighty farmers for Texas, who are dissatisfied with the agricultural prospects of England.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Sir Henry Bessemer has had a big telescope constructed for himself at a cost of \$200,000.

The French Academy has awarded a first prize for virtue to a sailor who has saved nine lives at the risk of his own; and a second prize to two women for maintaining an orphanage by their own united labor.

William Ulmer has fallen heir to an estate in France worth \$100,000 by the death of his father in Paris. Ulmer at one time was barkeeper at the Lookout House in Cincinnati, but his whereabouts are now unknown.

The Greenville (Mass) Advertiser says that a saloon keeper on the Arkansas side of the river, after selling the contents of a whiskey barrel, found therein the remains of a child. The stamp on the barrel was four years old. This reminds one of the "Pasha of Many Tales."

The Spanish settlement of Sante Fe, as a town, is more than three hundred years old, and as it probably antedates St. Augustine, it is the oldest European town in the United States. It has a Catholic Church over three hundred years old.

Chief Justice Morris, of Ireland, with his wife and daughter, were recently driving through a pass in the Tyrol, when an avalanche was heard. They jumped out of the carriage and hastened on. The carriage was swept away and the driver was killed.

A young man at Spaxton, England, thought that it would be fun to set fire to a nearly empty cask of benzoline. He dropped a lighted match in the bung hole and ran. One person was killed by the explosion, and the young man is in prison awaiting his trial on a charge of manslaughter.

George Thompson was on his death bed in a hospital at Lexington, Ky. He sent for a police detective and confessed that he was a fugitive murderer from Tennessee, saying that he did not wish to die with the crime on his conscience. But he soon rallied, and there being hope of his recovery, declared that the confession must have been the freak of delirium, as he remembered nothing about it, and certainly had never killed anybody. However he had time before he died to confess anew what was found to be the truth.

A new song is interrogatively entitled, "Can You Support Me, Darling?" If your darling works in a shirt factory, and doesn't care much for dress herself, and you don't spend her money for beer or billiards, and she keeps her health, and you are willing to turn in now and then and earn a few dollars by digging cellars or peddling clams, the probabilities are that she can support you. But we advise her to shirk you for some fellow who can support her.

Thomas H. Stobens and Helen Reed were married at Ephesus, Penn., against the wishes of the Reed family, the bride's brother, particularly, having opposed the match. The young couple were at the village hotel, getting ready to start on their honeymoon tour, when the brother dashed into the room in great rage, attempted to shoot Stobell. The girl saved her husband's life by seizing her brother's pistol, but the excitement speedily caused her death.

THE SPRING HILL MINES.—A despatch of the 27th to the Sackville Post, from Spring Hill, N. S., says:—"A meeting of miners is being held here this p. m. Messrs. Byers, McFarlane and Hall are in attendance. Nothing definite has yet been arrived at. The miners seem determined to hold out for better terms. The company has offered them the same as before the second reduction to which they will not hear under any consideration. Everything is very quiet. It is rumored that a crowd of miners are coming from Cape Breton. The loss to the company will probably be heavy, having to supply the railway with coal from Pictou."

THE NEW YORK TRIBUNE of last Saturday publishes interviews with a large number of prominent business men on trade prospects, and says that the leading men of New York express the belief that times are steadily improving. The abundant harvest in the West and South are cited for the basis of this belief. The revival of manufacturing interests in different parts of the country is also mentioned as a proof of returning prosperity. Prices in all departments of trade are firm, with a tendency to rise. Many cases of the volume of business the past five or six months show an increase over that of any corresponding period since 1873, and in every instance the volume of business thus far the present season is considerably in excess of last year. Intelligence has been received that a more cheerful feeling exists all over the land than at any time since 1873.
