PERSONAL

Mr. E. A. Earle will leave Halifax on Saturday for Victoria B. C. having been assigned to a position in the Merchant's Bank of Halifax branch in that city. We congratulate him on his promotion.

We announce with regret the death of Mr. Jesse Burns of Freetown. Mr. Burns was an intelligent and progressive farmer and for several years Grand Scribe of the order of Sons of Temperance.

D W Higgins, who has just resigned from the speakership of the British Columbia legislature, is one of the pioneers of that province. He was born at Halifax Nov. 30, 1834. His family removed to the United States two years after his birth. He was educated in Brooklyn, N. Y., but went to California while still a young man and founded the Call newspaper in San Francisco. He sold the paper in 1858 and went to British Columbia. He became editor and proprietor of the Victoria Colonist. He saw much of pioneer life, of moving accidents by flood and field, in the early days of the Pacific province. He became a member of the legislature in 1886 and was chosen speaker in 1890. Mrs. Higgins, his wife, is a native of Charlottetown who accompanied her husband around the Horn and shared his fortunes.

SHANGHAI, March 11.—An English steamer has successfully ascended the Yang Tse rapids as far as Chung King, province of Sze Chueno, the junction of the Kia Lin King with Yang Tse, thus opening to navigation the most fertile track of the Yang Tse valley. The Chinese authorities have announced their intent on to remove all obstacles with dynamite.

The province of Sze Chuen, written also Se Chuen, is one of the largest of the western provinces of China, with an area of 166 880 square miles and an estimated population of nearly 25,000,000. It has Tibet on the west, and is traversed by the Yang Tse Kiang, to which all its other rivers are tributary. It produces sugar, silk and oranges, but its chief products are rhubarb, drugs, musk and metals. The chief city is Chung Tu Fu.

PALMER-TON, Ont., March 16.—The meeting of the Orange grand lodge opened here yesterday Grand Master Lockhart in his address, spoke strongly against the proposal to appoint a papal legate for Canada, and expressed the hope that Manitoba would grant no special privileges to Roman Catholic schools.
