GOOD ADVICE FOR DAIRYMEN!

We clip the following paragraphs from The Canadian Cheese and Butter Maker. They ought to be particularly noted at this juncture.

"Dairymen simply turn their pocket books wrong side out every time they take poor milk to the factory, and get it accepted.

"Don't forget that milk can be kept on the farm overnight pure and sweet without the use of ice. All you have to do is to aerate it and aerate it thoroughly. No half way business, remember.

By taking good care of your milk you are earning money just as fast as by making your cows yield more of it."

"We often meet dairymen who profess to have no faith in the Babcock test. They are generally owners of poor cows, who patronize creameries where there is talk of paying for the milk according to the test. Their very argument against it proves that it is a good thing.

"Any dairyman who had a-fourth or a third more cream in his milk than his neighbor does not like to divide it up with him by taking a common share from the factory returns. The Babcock test prevents unjust robbery, and no truly honest dairyman can find fault with it.

We often hear it advised, "Milk your cows regularly, or they may shrink in yield." That statement should be made a little more positively. You must milk them regularly or they will shrink every time.

"Dairymen often imagine that it is optional with them to do thus and so. They should all understand that there is a right way and a wrong way, and that the first always means profit and the latter always means loss.

"Do you ever think that when milk is once tainted or in any way spoiled you can no more make it good milk again than you can rotten apples sound? A chemical change takes place that ruins the milk forever. That is the reason why all intelligent butter and cheese makers lay such stress on its care."

FROM THE CAPITAL

News From the Political and Social Centre of Canada.

The tuberculosis congress at Berlin opened on Wednesday. There were delegates present from Great Britain, the United States, Russia, France, Italy, Austria-Hungary and other countries. The Emperor of Germany occupied a seat in the gallery. The German minister of the interior, in his inaugural address, referred to this congress and to the peace conference at the Hague, and said that the two events constitute memorable pages in the history of civilization.

EXPERIENCES OF AMERICANS

Ian Maclaren Tells What he Notices.

LIVERPOOL, June 1.—Before his congregation in Sifton Park Presbyterian Church, Liverpool, the Rev. John Watson (Ian Maclaren,) took for his subject his recent American experiences. The Sunday newspapers in the United States he said, were an unmitigated curse to the people, and London was to be congratulated on the failure of the attempt to introduce the innovation there.

The one thing which above all others started him, Dr. Watson said, was the power of the secular spirit in America, and the weakness of the Christian Church. Men were devoted to money and money getting in a way and to a degree which he could not have imagined possible.

The churches in the United States, he continued, were conducted, to a considerable extent, as large business concerns, money-making permeating everything. In many districts he found congregations consisting almost entirely of women.

Dr. Watson eulogized the vivacity, intellect and energy, the boundless resources, high hope and confidence of the American race, which he declared to be one of the most promising of the Anglo-Saxon branches. The readiness of rich Americans to build and endow educational institutions he considered a matter for national pride.
