Christian fellowship enjoyed. During the social hour the ladies of the entertaining society served a delicious lunch.

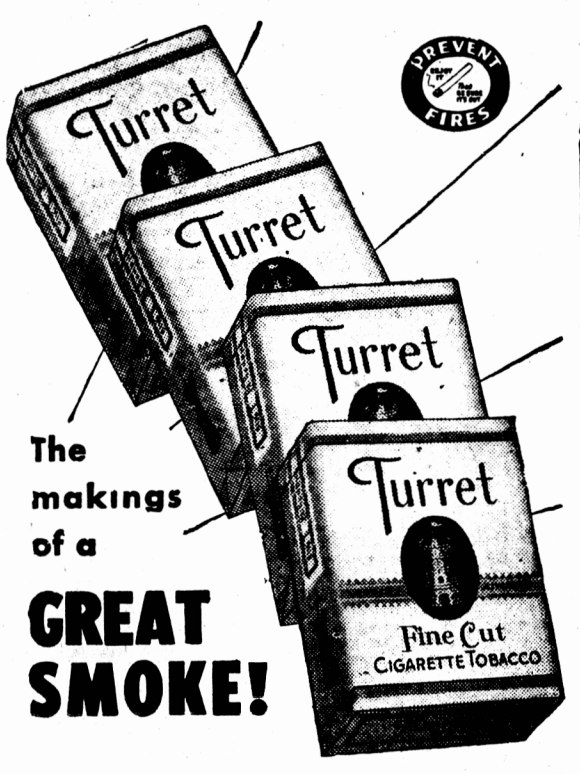
