SOURIS NOTES. At the Scottish Gathering on the 16th inst., a number of citizens of Charlottetown and vicinity, who had not been in Souris for some nine or ten years past, expressed their surprise to see the substantial growth of the town. Several splendid residences and large business establishments have been built and are occupied by thrifty business men.

Some thirty snug cottages have been erected at the eastern end of Main Street, adding very much to the business appearance of the town. Our genial friend, Capt. Dominic McDonald, formerly of Charlottetown, seems to have retired from seafaring life, judging from the fact that he has become owner of part of the Knight estate with its fine residence and commanding view of the gulf.

There are about fifty men at work on the breakerwater contract, which will greatly improve the shipping facilities of the commercial capital of King's County.

About 75 vessels of the fishing fleet in the bay, both Americans and Canadians, put into the harbor on Friday and Saturday last for shelter from the heavy gale which prevailed.

The steamer City of Ghent, Capt. Pyc, commander, on the route between Halifax and Souris, had several distinguished visitors from New York and other cities on her trip last week. They patronized the Sea View Hotel, B. Cox, proprietor.

Front fishing, duck and snipe shooting, boating, surf bathing and other health giving exercises are accessible within easy distance of the Sea View, the proprietor of which treated his guests to 74 delicious trout, caught by himself at North Lake on Saturday.

That the Caledonian Club day was a success at Souris goes without saying, but there would have been a much larger gathering from the outlying districts of the county had it not been raining heavily in the morning. The programme was well carried out, excepting the announcement that "short speeches by prominent Scotchmen" would be given. But from some cause or other this part of the programme was not called, excepting a few remarks from Senator Macdonald, preparatory to delivering the prizes to successful competitors. The omission could not be for want of public men being present, among whom were two members from King's County, representing us in the Commons of Canada, the Commissioner of Public Works and his colleague from East Point, and others.

SEWAGE IRRIGATION.

A Typical Drainage Plant Recently Completed in India.

Some interesting particulars are given by "London Engineering" with regard to the progress of the drainage works at a sewage farm in Ahmedabad, India. It is officially reported that up to the present time 966 house connections have been completed, the sewage water of which is being daily carried by drain to the pumping station, whence it is pumped to the sewage farm, situated at a distance of more than two miles. The works which have been drained are said to be greatly improved from a sanitary point of view, and there are no complaints from householders whose houses have been connect with the sewers.

Fish-bugs tanks are provided at the head of sewers, which are flushed every day, and although some of the sewers have been used for more than four months, there is no silt in them. The drainage of the drainage system are said to be so good that with proper arrangements of flushing the drains, no nuisance need be feared. By making the house connections already completed it has been possible to discontinue the use of 452 cesspits, which polluted the soil, water and air, and which are so strongly denounced by all the sanitary authorities. The total area included in the scheme is about 91 acres, and 32 acres of this area, containing 1500 houses, having been finished, the municipality have decided on sanitary and economic grounds to finish the complete scheme, by which the town of Ahmedabad will be extended to about 5000 houses. The sewage farm is also said to be a success: the land is sandy loam, and readily absorbs large quantities of sewage water.

It is confidently expected that, taking into consideration the intrinsic value of the water as well as the manurial ingredients of the sewage, the drainage scheme properly managed will not only be a sanitary reform, but will repay well from the crops it will help to produce.
