AN ENGAGEMENT REPORTED

The Result Not as Yet Stated

GENERAL WHITE CONFIDENT OF SUCCESS

Stated That Boers are Attacking Mafeking With Prospects of Success—Lord Salisbury's Son is There.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER]

EDINBURGH, Oct 14.—The Scotsman, this morning asserts that a battle has been engaged in between General Sir George Stewart White, commanding the forces in Natal, and the Boers who entered Natal by way of the Vaurenaus pass.

General White, The Scotsman says, is very sanguine of the success of the British movements.

The foreign report is considered to be correct. As late as last night War Office had no news of British advance from Ladysmith and was hourly expecting further intelligence.

LONDON, Oct 14.—A despatch to the Daily Telegraph from its correspondent at Ladysmith dated at noon on Friday, says: "A strong mobile column under General Sir George Stewart White, accompanied by General Sir Archibald Hunter, proceeded before daybreak towards Acton Thomes for the purpose of reconnoitering."

General White's object was to observe what was going on and also to test the mobility and efficiency of his forces.

General White had 12 guns and the Boers 11.

The Daily Mail's Cape Town correspondent telegraphing on Friday evening says: "I learn, on good authority, that the Boers are attacking Mafeking. They are reported to have already suffered several repulses."

It is generally admitted that Vrburg cannot stand a strong Boer attack.

According to the Daily Mail's Cape Town correspondent Mr. Schreiner, the premier of Cape Colony, will unreservedly support the Imperial government. His previous reserve was dictated by a desire to drive extreme Dutch residents to excess.

It is an interesting fact that Lord Edward Cecil, son of the Marquis of Salisbury is with Colonel Baden-Powell at Mafeking.

ANOTHER TRAIN CAPTURED BY BOERS

Two Old Guns in the Hands of the Enemy.

TELEGRAPH COMMUNICATION BROKEN.

Women and Children Sent to Cape Town.

LONDON, Oct 14.—The War Office has received the following despatch from the general commanding the Cape forces:

CAPE TOWN, Oct. 13, 1.49 p. m.—An armored train from Mafeking escorting two seven pounder guns sent from here to Mafeking was attacked last night at Krafzpan. Apparently a rail had been removed. The train left the track and the Boers fired into it with artillery for half an hour and captured it.

Telegraph communication with Mafeking is interrupted at Krafzpan.

The woman and children have been sent to Cape Town. The guns referred to belong to the Colony. They are light and an old pattern. We have no details as to casualties."

CECIL RHODES' NARROW ESCAPE

His Train Delayed as He Laid Low.

BELIEVES STRENGTH OF THE BOERS EXAGGERATED

Reported that the Boers Have Reached Newcastle.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Oct. 14.—According to the Kimberley correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, Cecil Rhodes is on his way here. His train was delayed as he passed to Madden River, three hours after expiration of ultimatum, when the Boers were only five miles distant and some of their spies were actually on the platform. Rhodes lay low and was not recognized. Had he been his capture would have been easy. The Lion was not defended. He believes that the strength of the enemy is greatly exaggerated.

Daily Mail's correspondent at Dundee, Natal, says: "Reports are circulated here that the Boers have reached Newcastle; but do confirmation of either this or of reports of fighting at Mafeking and Ladysmith are yet arrived."

1000 CANADIANS TO GO TO SOUTH AFRICA

Names of Volunteers to be Forwarded to Militia Department.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, Oct. 14.—The Government announces that 1000 men will be sent to the Transvaal, Canada paying transportation to point of debarkation for Africa, where the regiment will be merged with, and fight as British troops.

There is no mention of pay, so it looks as if this were a compromise with Mr. Tarte. The regiment will probably sail on the 31st inst. The highest officer will be a Major.

The movement is to be entirely a volunteer one. Number of officers and men determined on is 1000,—which is a much larger number than that supplied by any other colony of the Empire. The Military Department will immediately provide arms and equipment for the necessary forces.

The commanding officers of the various corps throughout Canada will be asked to obtain the names of volunteers to be forwarded to the Minister of Militia.

Only men in the very best physical condition will be accepted and a preference will be given to good marksmen.

It is expected for obvious reasons that chiefly unmarried men will form the contingent.

On their arrival in South Africa they will be received into the Imperial army and will come under Imperial army regulations. The enrollment will commence at once.
