trate's Court this forenoon.

OYSTER FISHING.—Three men from  
Johnston's River had their boat seized and  
were summoned before Inspector Duvar  
this morning charged with fishing oysters  
illegally. As the parties claimed to be  
poor, their boat was restored to them and  
they were let off with a warning.

REMEMBER the meeting in Zion Church at  
7.30. The addresses to-night will be of an  
enlightening character on the principles of  
prohibition, and as both gentlemen feel very  
much invigorated, they will be all the better  
prepared to edify and instruct on the great  
topics of which they speak. A collection will  
be taken up.

RELATIVES of Sir John Macdonald in King-  
ton have received letters from him contradict-  
ing the stories that he is in a despondent  
frame of mind, and stating that he is cheerful  
and buoyant, and only requires a careful diet,  
to put him in first-class condition. Sir John  
is said to be anxious to return to Riviere du  
Loup, where he has a summer house.

WALLACE ROSS leaves St. John this week  
for Portland, Maine, where he will join  
Davis and Kennedy. He says he is deter-  
mined to have a race with Hanlan, for the  
sum named by the latter, \$5,000, if he can  
possibly raise the money. He is confident  
of success, and thinks the high stakes  
named by Hanlan is only a ruse to avoid a  
contest.

In the forenoon of yesterday, at Prince  
street Methodist Church, and in the evening  
at the Kirk, Rev. Dr. McKay, of For-  
mosa, preached eloquently and at great  
length, to very large audiences, on the sub-  
ject of his mission. He also addressed the  
Sunday School of Zion Church, in the  
afternoon. He has created a great deal of  
interest in his missionary life and work.

A HEAVY storm, accompanied by loud  
thunder and vivid lightning, passed over  
this city yesterday evening between 7 and  
8 o'clock. Several of the tombstones in  
the English burying ground, on Upper  
Spring Park Road, were struck and broken  
to pieces, and the lightning appeared so  
bright around the Upper Prince Street  
Church as to cause a kind of panic in the  
congregation. At Southport, the cottage  
of a man in the employ of Henry Beer,  
Esq., was struck. The chimney was shat-  
tered, and a stove, to use the words of our  
informant, "was scattered promiscuously  
around the room."

THE HEAVENS—Venus reached her greatest  
brilliance on Saturday, and her greatest  
elongation west will be reached on the 12th  
of July, to-morrow. On the 20th of this month  
Mercury will appear in the evening sky, being  
then 25 degrees 9 minutes east of the sun. The  
long twilight, however, will interfere with ob-  
servations. The constellations of the summer  
are now in their glory. Gemini, Leo and  
Auriga are sinking in the west. Virgo has  
passed the meridian. Bootes is nearly on the  
meridian. The handle of the great dipper is  
in the zenith. Due north, Perseus skirts the  
horizon. Hercules is approaching the meridian,  
and the constellation of the Lyre is well  
up in the northeast. The great cross of  
Cygnus still lies prone along the milky way  
below the Lyre, and Aquila is rising in the  
southeast. Scorpio, with its red heart,  
Antares, is the glory of the south.

NOT BOGUS.—The case of Francis Mc-  
Donald, charged with uttering bogus coin,  
was resumed at the Stipendiary Magistrate's  
Court this forenoon. The evidence of Mr.  
Brown, of the Boston Silver Plating Co.,  
and that of Mr. William W. Wellner was  
heard. Mr. Brown testified that the coin  
produced, and said to be bogus, was washed  
for a few days and then grow dim, as it  
was to-day. He could not swear whether  
coin was silver or nickel, and he believed  
that to keep it so bright as it was when  
shown to him the first day, it must have  
been washed a short time  
previous to his seeing it. Mr. Wellner  
testified the coins, said to be bogus, and tes-  
tified that it was as good as the coin in  
regular circulation—it was not bogus.  
These facts, brought to light, knocked the  
bottom entirely out of the case so far as  
bogus money was concerned, and Mr. Mc-  
Donald was discharged. There is some-  
thing strange about this case, and a great  
injustice seems to have been done to Mr.  
McDonald. He positively asserts that he  
never saw the coin previous to the trial,  
much less pass them over his counter to the  
complainant, Donald McDonald, three  
weeks ago. This statement is strengthened  
by the evidence of Mr. Brown, who has  
had much experience in silver washing and  
silver plating. He says that the wash  
would only remain on coin about three days,  
and his statement is corroborated by the  
fact that, while the coins said to be bogus,  
dazzled with brightness on Thursday last,  
to-day they are dim as zinc. These facts  
show that Mr. McDonald has been  
improperly treated, and that the Magistrate  
should hereafter be careful, before arraign-  
ing a person on a serious charge, to see that  
there is good grounds for so doing.

**TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.**  
**CANADIAN**  
There was no interference by the Long-  
shoremen with the laborers engaged at the  
wharves to-day, and everything passed off  
peaceably.  
Several of the strikers were wounded by  
the police; one named Grevillier and  
another named Young very badly, but not  
necessarily fatally. A lady in Murphy's  
Hotel, opposite the wharf, narrowly es-  
caped death, as a bullet went through the  
window within two inches of where she  
was looking out.  
The strikers held a mass meeting in  
Chaboulez Square to-night. The speech of  
the president, Patrick Carroll, was con-  
siderably moderated. He counselled arbi-  
tration to settle the dispute. It was evi-  
dent the strike is nearing its end. The  
meeting separated quietly. None of the  
police were shot last night, but several  
received serious wounds from stone throw-  
ing.

**UNITED STATES.**  
**CHICAGO, July 8.**  
Mrs. Dunn, mother of the lady whom  
Guiteau married, is an inmate of the House  
for Aged Women, near Chicago. She  
asserts that the brother of Guiteau's father  
died in an insane asylum.  
**CINCINNATI, July 8.**  
The aggregate losses by last night's fire  
will reach \$1,000,000. The remaining por-  
tion of the Resor foundry was burned.  
There are no additional facts concerning the  
loss of life. The police report that there  
have been no enquiries for missing people,  
and hopes are entertained that all Marquis  
employees escaped. Several firemen were  
injured by falling walls.

**ALBANY, N. Y., July 8.**  
Warner Miller and R. T. Lapham have  
been nominated by the Republicans for the  
U. S. Senate, to fill the terms vacant by  
the resignation of Senators Platte and  
Conkling, respectively.  
**BUFFALO, N. Y., July 8.**  
Three hundred and sixty head of cattle  
were burned to death by the burning of  
Firmenich's feeding barns this afternoon.

**NEWS FROM EUROPE.**  
**LONDON, July 8.**  
The destruction of property in East Lan-  
cashire from the recent storm is very great.  
Over fifty mills stopped work and many  
thousands of persons are thrown out of em-  
ployment.  
It is announced this morning that Baron  
Hathely (Sir Wm. Page Wood) is dying.  
He was Lord Justice at the Appeals Court,  
and afterwards, during Mr. Gladstone's first  
administration, held the office of Lord  
Chancellor. He is in his 81st year.  
The Telegraph's Paris correspondent says  
that Hava's agency again contradicts the  
report of intended mobilization of 120,000  
French troops.

The Standard says the dying embers of  
the Eastern question have been again dis-  
turbed by France. It is a melancholy re-  
flection that Europe is being preserved  
from a new outbreak of warlike activity  
only by the good sense of the Italians and  
the pacific tendency of England and cen-  
sious helplessness of Turkey.  
The French frigates Alma, Reine and  
Blanche and three gunboats are shelling  
Sfax. A transport with 1,200 Tunisian  
troops is lying off Sfax. The English gun-  
boat Bitterin has gone there.  
The French journals La Liberte and La  
National evince great irritation at the re-  
cent question in the British Parliament  
about the French operations in Tunis, and  
warn the House of Lords and the House  
of Commons that they had better mind their  
own business.

**MADRID, July 8.**  
A Maltese barque which left Sfat yester-  
day morning, reports that the French fire  
has destroyed all the forts, the great mosque  
and part of the Mussulman quarters at  
that place. The insurgents are still re-  
sisting.

**LONDON, July 8.**  
Lefoy, charged with the murder of Mr.  
Gould on the Brighton Railway, on the  
27th ult., has been arrested at Stepney,  
East London. He has made a full confes-  
sion.  
The appointment of Hon. L. S. S. West  
as British Minister at Washington, to suc-  
ceed Sir Edward Thornton, is gazetted.

**MEXICO.**  
**SANTA FE, July 8.**  
On Sunday the stage coach from El Paso  
to Chihuahua was attacked by Indians who  
fired a volley. The driver was killed. The  
passengers escaped except Pugh—son of ex-  
Senator Pugh—who was captured while en-  
deavoring to get a pistol out of the coach.  
The coach was burned and a large amount  
of Chihuahua money torn to fragments was  
found on the ground.


