St. Paul's Men's Ass'n Meeting

Mr. Reg. Howard was guest speaker at the regular monthly supper meeting of St. Paul's Men's Association held last evening in the parish hall and presided over by the president, Mr. W. R. Brennan.

Revise Teachers' Pension Plan

A revision of the methods in granting superannuation to teachers will enable an additional 217 school teachers to qualify for a pension upon the completion of their professional career according to a bill given a second reading in the Legislature yesterday afternoon.

The Minister of Education, Hon. Keir Clark, stated that the primary purpose of this "was to assist married teachers. He stated that there were quite a number in the Province who had returned to teaching after an absence of seven or eight years.

The amendment also helps those who taught school prior to July 31, 1931. They will now be eligible for a pension. There are about 70 in this category.

Can Change Names Of Departments

According to a bill given second reading in the Legislature yesterday afternoon the Government will be empowered to change the names of two Departments if the occasion should arise.

"Under the bill entitled "An Act to Amend the Legislative Assembly Act" the Departments of Health and Welfare, Public Works and Highways may be transferred as far as the names are concerned.

Premier Matheson stated that instead of the Department of Public Works and Highways, the Department could be termed "Public Welfare and Highways" while the Dept. of Health and Welfare could be named "Dept. of Health and Public Works."

He stated, in answering strong objections by the members of the Opposition, that this was being done to provide for a contingency if it should arise.

The proposed nomenclature change will not provide any more openings for Ministers. According to the rules there can only be nine members on the Executive Council.

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Opposition Leader spent I know of dozens of services that could be provided to the farmers.

Federation Request "The Farmers Federation were asking for an Artificial Insemination Unit here. In Nova Scotia there are things like that. The Nova Scotia Government spent \$7,000 on a breeding establishment at Truro and the New Brunswick Government is providing similar services.

"We talk of field men. Over in New Brunswick they divide the Province into 16 agricultural districts and have two men in these districts who are somewhat similar to Deputy Ministers of Agriculture. These 32 men are hired at salaries of about \$4,000 each to aid the farmers. They work in addition to the fieldmen, horticulturalists, foresters and veterinarians for the benefit of the farmer.

"We have no objections to seeing the Government come out every year if the essential services are taken care of," stated Mr. Bell.

Health And Welfare The Opposition leader stated that the Department of Health and Welfare had kept money from the people between the ages of 65 and 66 with the result that the old people in Prince Edward Island were receiving less than those in any of the other Provinces.

"We are paying the lowest amounts in Canada although there is a lot of money to spend on these people," he stated. "The Minister does not realize what a difference there is to these people between 15 and 30 dollars a month. They are not like himself, holding down two or three jobs."

"I'd trade salaries with you any year," retorted the Minister of Health and Welfare.

He stated that it was an old story of the Liberal party before election time to promise assistance in processing products and assistance.

AUSSIES HOMEWARD-BOUND PUSAN, Korea, (AP)—The 2nd Battalion Royal Australian Regiment sailed for home today aboard the troopship New Australia after one year's service in Korea. In the final months of the war the battalion lost 21 men killed, 119 wounded and two missing in action.
