

Too Severe.

The Argus says:—Mr. Joseph Millburn Dixon is not a faint-hearted politician. On the occasion of his second defeat, he has addressed another card to the electors of Belfast, wherein he thanks them for the very handsome vote which they gave him on the 21st ult., and announces that, if spared, he will contest the District again in the future. McDonald's Tobacco Factory.

In the course of his tour of the manufactories of Montreal, the other day, Sir Leonard Tilley visited the Tobacco Factory of Mr. W. C. McDonald, formerly of this Island. The Gazette says:—"The visitors were greatly impressed with the magnitude of the factory, which employs the large number of one thousand hands, who are all working full time. Everything requisite to place the article of manufacture in a saleable state for the market—such as the boxes in which the tobacco is enclosed, the tin stamps constituting the trade mark, etc.—is made on the premises. In the course of conversation it was learned that during the last six months the business has been on the increase, and is at present in a highly satisfactory state."

CELERY AS A CURE FOR RHEUMATISM.—New discoveries, or what claim to be discoveries of the healing virtues of plants are continually making. One of the latest is that celery is a cure for rheumatism, indeed, it is asserted that the disease is impossible if the vegetable be cooked and freely eaten. The fact that it is almost always put on the table raw prevents its therapeutic powers from becoming known. The celery should be cut into bits, boiled in water until soft, and the water drunk by the patient. Put new milk, with a little flour and nutmeg into a saucepan with the boiled celery, serve it warm with pieces of toast, eat it with potatoes and the painful ailment will soon yield. Such is the declaration of a physician who has again and again tried the experiment and with uniform success. He adds that cold or damp never produces but simply develops the disease of which acid blood is the primary and sustaining cause, and that while the blood is alkaline there can be neither rheumatism nor gout. English statistics show that in one year—1876, 3,640 persons died of rheumatism and every case, it is claimed, might have been cured or prevented by the adoption of the remedy mentioned, at least two-thirds of the cases named. Heart disease are ascribed to rheumatism and its agonizing ally, gout. Small pox, so much dreaded, is not half so destructive as rheumatism, which, it is maintained by many physicians can be prevented by obeying Nature's law in diet. But if you have incurred it, boiled celery is pronounced unhesitatingly to be a specific.

THE INSTRUMENT OF PUNISHMENT.—In accordance with a decision of the Toronto School Board, the Committee on Printing and Supplies have been instructed to procure twenty-five rubber straps, one for each school, fifteen inches long and one and a half inches wide, to be used as the only instrument in administering corporal punishment to pupils attending the several schools.

WONDERFUL TROTTING.—San Francisco, Oct. 25.—Yesterday, Gen. Grant attended the Exhibition trot on Oakland Track. St. Julian was brought out to beat the best time made by Rarus. St. Julian was followed a short distance by a running horse. He never made a skip or break, coming in in the unprecedented time of 2:12, apparently but little the worse for his effort. The result was received with prolonged cheering.

MR. ANDREW WILSON, part proprietor of the Montreal Herald, and formerly chief editor of that paper, died on Monday morning last from softening of the brain. The deceased gentleman was well known in Montreal, having held an honorable position for many years in the city. He was a Mason and was buried with Masonic ceremonies.
