

# Musial Homers Again As Cards Lick Dodgers 10-3

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Stan Musial, leading the major leagues in homers and runs batted in, drove in four more tallied Tuesday night with his 20th home run and a triple as St. Louis Cardinals drubbed Brooklyn Dodgers 10-3, breaking their own three-game losing streak and the National League champions' string of 10 consecutive victories.

Musial, whose RBIs now total 66, had considerable company as St. Louis, hitting safely in every inning, pounded out 16 blows off Carl Erskine and his replacements, Ben Wade and Ely Palica.

Rookie star Wally Moon also drove in four runs with a triple and three singles.

While Erskine went down to his fifth defeat against six victories, a crowd of 22,294 saw the Dodgers, fumbling in contrast to a sharp Redbird defence, outscored heavily even though they finished with 11 blows, which included Gil Hodges' 14th homer and a double, plus three singles by Carl Furillo.

PHILADELPHIA (CP)—Chicago White Sox climbed into first place in the American League Tuesday night as they poured five runs across the plate in the seventh inning to whip Philadelphia Athletics 9-3. A two-run double by Ferris Fain and George Kell's homer with one on highlighted the inning.

Bob Trice and the Athletics made a game of it through the first six innings, despite a flurry of errors.

In the decisive seventh, Johnny Groh singled, Chico Carrasquel doubled and Nellie Fox walked to load the bases. Minnie Minoso's sacrifice fly scored Groh. Fain's double scored Carrasquel and Fox, and Kell's homer brought in Fain.

The Sox picked up two runs in the first as third baseman Jim Finigan threw high to first base and Don Bollweg's attempted cut off at the plate sent into the stands.

Another Bollweg throw into the stands let two more runs across in the second.

A walk to Bill Renna and Vic Power's homer gave the A's two runs in the second.

Veteran Virgil Trucks allowed only four hits in getting his eighth win against three losses. It was Trice's fourth defeat against six victories.

# Poulton Wins By Decision; Trainor, Roy & Lund Also Win

Harry "Kid" Poulton of Charlottetown outboxed Tony Percy of Montreal to gain a split decision over the Montreal fighter in the main bout of the Boosters boxing card at the Forum last night. Poulton weighed 157 and Percy 152.

The counter-punching Poulton, after getting away to a slow start, piled up points in the late rounds as he outboxed the aggressive Frenchman. Poulton, with a big height and reach advantage scored mostly with his left hand. He seldom used his right.

There were no knockdowns during the fight and few solid punches landed. Percy was the aggressor throughout but could not find a target in the elusive Poulton who kept scoring on light left jabs.

Percy scored mostly in the second, third and fourth rounds. He bruised Poulton above the left eye in the third round while Poulton in return drew blood from Percy's nose in the fifth frame.

Poulton made his most impressive looking attack late in the seventh round when he combined several good punches on Percy's head in a neutral corner. He landed several more good punches in the ninth round and both boys slugged it out rather unscientifically in the tenth.

Judge George Hooper voted six rounds for Poulton, and four even; Judge Tom White saw it four rounds for Percy, three for Poulton and three even. Referee George Stewart had Poulton out front four rounds against three for Percy and three even.

Don "Duck" Trainor won an unanimous six round decision over Gerry Fraser of Halifax in the best fight of the card. Trainor gave a brilliant performance against the game Fraser and at the end of the fight the crowd stood up and cheered the boys.
