Notes of the Week.

The King's County Election case is now before the Committee on Privileges and Elections. It will be remembered that when about to make his return, the Returning Officer received notice from Mr. Hodgson that if the disqualified candidate were returned by him, he would be sued for the penalty prescribed by the Dominion Elections Act.

If any such member of a Provincial Legislature shall, notwithstanding his disqualification, as in the preceding section mentioned, receive a majority of votes at any such election, such majority of votes shall be thrown away, and it shall be the duty of the Returning Officer to return the person having the next greatest number of votes provided he be otherwise eligible.

Mr. Blake and his partisans have attacked the Returning Officer because he used his own judgment in the case; but, in the light of the law, it clearly appears that Sir John McDonald and his supporters, only have cause to complain, and that Mr. Hodgson was legally right in demanding the return of Mr. McDonald alone.

When the papers on these subjects are presented to us they will receive our earnest consideration. We thank your Honor for the assurance that the accounts of the past year will be laid before us, and that the estimates for the present year will be submitted at an early day.

That the course of immigration has been changed since the advent of the administration of Sir John McDonald, is proved by evidence which will not be called in question. The United States press are lamenting the fall of the tide of Canadian immigration into that country; and the Boston Traveller admits that the falling off is probably due to "the better industrial state of affairs" in this country.

The assault upon Lady Florence Dixie, Windsor Park, was one of the events of the week. The papers say that out in the open with a rifle in her hand, Lady Florence would be a fair match for a dozen of such persons as those who attempted to murder her and were driven off by her dog, and that while she was in the Transvaal lately, the Boers said of her that she was the only Englishman of whose marksmanship they were afraid.

It is, perhaps, not unnatural that one who is quick to charge others with "moral obliquity" should wince when the morality (or rectitude) of his own public conduct is called into question; but it is astonishing that the first impulse of a gentleman of high culture and fine feelings should be to seize, as the ready instrument of his revenge, a vulgar horse-whip.

M. Ancelet, a French experimentalist and the discoverer of the system of heating with crystalline acetate of soda has demonstrated the much slower cooling of foot warmers containing that substance than that of the ordinary ones with water. Two leading French lines of railway have this system in general use, and in England the London & North-western railway, which had last year 3,000 of such warmers in service, had this year 6,000.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE. HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

DRAFT ADDRESS. The following is a copy of the Draft Address submitted by Dr. Gillis on Thursday:

To His Honor the Honorable Thomas Heath, Governor of the Province of Prince Edward Island, etc.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOR.—We, Her Majesty's faithful subjects, the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, thank your Honor for the speech with which you opened this, the first Session of the 29th General Assembly of this Province.

We heartily unite with your Honor in expressing thankfulness to Almighty God for the many blessings vouchsafed to us during the past year.

It is pleasing for us to know that efforts in the cause of Agriculture, stock-raising, and other useful industries in this Province are showing undoubted evidences of steady progress in those pursuits.

We agree with your Honor in hoping that the improved breeds of cattle and sheep imported by the Government in September last, for the use of this Province, may prove of advantage to our farmers and the Island generally.

The successful efforts of the people of this Island in competing at Exhibitions with the other Provinces of the Dominion of Canada, will no doubt encourage them to participate in the Dominion Exhibitions to be held in St. John, N. B. this year; and we will gladly give our assistance in order that this Province may be properly represented thereat.

Knowing the great advantages to our Province of having efficient and continuous steam communication, winter and summer, with the other Provinces of the Dominion, it affords us much pleasure to learn that a Minute of the Executive Council of this Province was, during the recess, transmitted to the Dominion Government, relating to the fulfilment of the part of Canada of the Terms of Union.

We thank your Honor for the assurance that the accounts of the past year will be laid before us, and that the estimates for the present year will be submitted at an early day.

The Accounts shall receive our best attention, and we will cheerfully vote such supplies as may be necessary for efficient maintenance of the public service.

When the papers on these subjects are presented to us they will receive our earnest consideration. We thank your Honor for the assurance that the accounts of the past year will be laid before us, and that the estimates for the present year will be submitted at an early day.

ESTIMATES FOR 1883-4. On the evening of the 21st inst., Sir Leonard Tilley brought down the estimates for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1884.

Public debt, (including sinking fund) \$9,156,985.

Charges of management, \$172,140. Civil Government, \$901,100. Administration of Justice, \$612,165.

Police, \$15,000. Penitentiaries, \$296,221. Legislation, \$648,900.

Arts, agriculture and statistics (including census,) \$113,500. Immigration and quarantine, \$570,487.

Pensions (including superannuation,) \$293,385. Militia, \$779,600.

Railways and Canals (chargeable to income) \$117,600. Public Works and Buildings (chargeable to income), \$2,447,940.

Mail subsidies, \$382,973. Ocean and River Services, \$208,000. Light House and Coast Service, \$520,825.

Fisheries, \$260,100. Scientific Institutions, \$55,750. Marine Hospitals and sick and destitute Seamen, \$62,000.

The above shows a decrease as compared with 1883 of \$9,373,118.

For steam communication between Canada and Antwerp, there is placed in the estimates the sum of \$24,000 and for communication between Canada and Germany a like amount.

Provision for examination of masters and mates exceeds that of last year by \$750.

For purchase of life boats, stations, life preservers, maintenance of crews and rewards for saving life, \$5,000, being an increase over last year of \$2,000.

The estimated expenses for maintenance and repairs of the seven Government steamers shows a decrease as compared with last year of \$10,000.

Lighthouse and Coast service of Dominion increase \$23,000.

Expenses steamboat inspection, increase \$7,000.

Intercolonial Railway working expenses, estimated increase, 1883-4, \$600,000; P. E. I. Railway, \$33,000.

The sum of \$2,000 has been placed in the estimates for sending a team to Shoeburyness.

Irish Notes. It has been arranged that Parnell will go to America, Mr. Seaton remaining to watch proceedings in Parliament.

Mr. E. Dwyer Gray, member of Parliament, has contributed £10 to a fund to relieve Parnell's estate from encumbrances.

Judge Lawson suggested the explosion in London, and the attract on Lady Florence Dixie, to the final efforts of the scorched reptile lawlessness.

In the Commons, on the 19th, Lord Edmund Fitzmaurice stated that no demand for mediation in the trouble between France and Madagascar had been made, and the government had no intention to increase the number of British ships in Madagascar waters.

Dr. Naevelay, Archbishop of Tuam, replying to Earl Spencer, on behalf of the Catholic Bishops in Ireland, writes that the action of the Government insisting on extending relief to distress people through the workhouse is an outrage on humanity and a covert system of exterminating the native race.

Richard Piggott, proprietor of the Irishman, repudiates the statement of Patrick Egan that he (Piggott) wrote to him threatening that unless Egan gave him £300 he would accept an offer of £500 made by the Dublin Castle officials to publish in his paper an article charging the officers of the Land League with misappropriating funds subscribed to the League.

The Irish members of Parliament discredit the story of Lady Florence Dixie that she was attacked with knives by two men disguised as women. The affair is puzzling every one. There is no clue to the assailants. A gardener potting plants 30 yards from the scene at the time of the outrage says he never saw or heard anything of the occurrence. Lady Florence says she called to her husband for help. She states that she should be sorry to attribute the outrage to the Land League.
