# Carl Hubbell Discusses Shortage Of Pitchers

MELBOURNE, Fla. (AP) — Carl Hubbell, the old pitching maestro of New York Giants, thinks overzealous radio and television announcers are responsible for the dearth of good young pitching prospects today.

The great southpaw, who in his official capacity as director of the Giant farm system looks over hundreds of young pitchers, took time off from his duties to discuss his pet peeve.

"Kids today have gone pitch crazy," he complained. "And it's the fault of the fellows behind the microphone. Not all, but most of them. These announcers feel that unless they dramatize the event that takes place, the game would be dull and uninteresting. They begin yelling off all kinds of imaginary pitches. Every pitch has a name to them. Listening to them, the kids obtain the false impression that they must have a variety of pitches in order to make the grade in professional baseball.

"The first thing the kids do," Hubbell continued, "is practise a knuckleball, a screwball, a fork ball, a palm pitch a slider and even a splitter. As a result, they are kicked before they start. They report to the trial camps with so many variety of pitches that the catcher just doesn't have enough signs to give them."

A kid pitcher need have only two pitches — a fast ball and a curve — and he could make any Class D club in the United States. Hubbell contends. He's got to be able to throw them over the plate, however.

"Not until he reaches Class A does a hurler have to have a third pitch," the old screwball expert said. "Then he should try to develop a change of pace pitch."

"Get the three basic pitches. Learn to control them, and you'll have no trouble reaching the big leagues. Try fooling around with trick pitches when you're 17 and 18 and you just don't have a chance."

# Ralph Kiner One of 20 Major League Holdouts

NEW YORK, (AP)—Pittsburgh's Ralph Kiner, balking at a 25-per-cent slash in his reported \$90,000 salary, is one of 20 major league baseball players who may be classified as holdouts.

A survey of the training camps by The Associated Press showed there are 11 in the National League and the same number in the American who haven't come to terms with their teams. March 1 is the accepted deadline for contract signings.

Cleveland Indians have three of their highest-priced stars in the "gimme most" category. They are pitcher Early Wynn, a 23-game winner in 1952 who wants \$35,000; centerfielder Larry Doby seeking \$30,000, and second baseman Bob Avila, \$23,000.

Three Cleveland second-line pitchers, Micky Harris, Lloyd Dickey and Jose Santiago, haven't come to terms yet.

Alvin Dark, New York Giants' veteran shortstop and field captain is asking \$40,000, some \$7,000 more than the Giants want to pay.

Most critical situation involves Kiner, the perennial National League home-run king. Kiner, who batted only .244 last season, said he had airmailed acceptance of an offer of \$75,500 made at a California conference Feb. 13.

But in Havana, Branch Rickey said he had changed his mind and any further negotiations would have to start with a 25-per-cent cut.

Boston Braves have five holdouts: pitchers Don Liddle and Vern Riffe; infielders Sibby Sisti and Bill Klaus; and outfielder Luis Marquez.

Philadelphia Phillies haven't signed first baseman Eddie Walsh, pitcher Ken Heintzelman and infielder Connie Ryan. But owner Bob Carpenter says he expects no trouble.

Gus Zernial, who hit 28 homers and batted in 100 runs for Philadelphia Athletics last season, has

# Grosse Opens Scoring As Islanders Shut Out Sydney Millionaires 6-0

The Charlottetown Islanders did the expected last night in defeating the Sydney Millionaires 6-0 and in so doing they displayed a new forward in the person of Erwin Grosse who is going to score more than his share of points in the important weeks that lie ahead.

Murph Chamberlain used his latest acquisition on left wing with "Buck" Whitlock and Bob Gray and the Shawinigan Falls graduate chipped in with a goal and an assist to help sink the Horeckmeu lower in the league cellar.

Whitlock himself came up with a goal and a helper to increase his lead over Halifax's Billy Watson to eight points in the M.M.H. L. scoring race. The goal was Whitlock's 50th of the season.

Chuck Holdaway and Al Millar also shared the spotlight. Young Holdaway, a vastly improved hockey player since his recent hospital treatment, fired two goals and Millar turned back 27 shots in registering his sixth collar-joi of the current campaign.

Goalie Nick Pidsodny got little protection from a Sydney defence, greatly weakened by the absence of Dunc MacIntyre, but Nick was plenty hot in the first period and again in the second and third sessions.

Two of the goals that got past Pidsodny were knocked into the net off his own players. The other four were bona fide goals. Nick had 47 drives directed on his net and got in the way of 41.

The Islanders, in command all the way, displayed a sharp passing attack. Time after time the line of Whitlock, Gray, and Grosse along with the defence of Gustavson and Wiseman hemmed the Millionaires in their end of the rink with passing plays that had the Millionaires helpless.

The Mills were contest most of the time to test Al Millar with long shots. Occasionally they worked through for close drives but found Millar unbeatible.

Lorne Pirie, after being sent into the clear by playing coach Horack, had a good chance in the first period. Johnny Morrow broke through in the third and Bill Tyskko also came close in the final session.

The Islanders came up with three goals late in the first period to go into a 3-0 lead. Grosse opened the scoring at the 15:04 mark when his 25 foot shot deflected off a Sydney player into the Millionaires' cage.

Almost four minutes later Holdaway combined with Marcel Clements for the Islanders' second goal. Clements put Holdaway into the clear and Chuck shot the puck along the ice into the short corner.

"Buck" Whitlock fired a 30-footer through a Sydney defenceman's legs to beat Pidsodny for the final goal of the period. Gus Gustavson and Bob Gray set up Whitlock.

Defenceman Larry Travis, carrying 12 stitches in his head as a result of a gash suffered in Glace Bay Saturday night, was struck on the right eyebrow by a puck during the first period. He had six stitches put in the cut before returning to finish the game.

**Flare-up Highlights Period**

The scoreless second period was highlighted by a flare-up between Morrow and Grosse. Morrow was the aggressor all the way and was given a two-minute sentence when he held and pushed Grosse as the latter steamed into the Sydney end on an Islanders attack.

The Islanders had several good scoring opportunities when the Millionaires played with Tyskko and Rowe in the penalty box. They kept the play around the Sydney net but could not test Pidsodny. On one occasion Whitlock hit the goal post.

The third period had just started when Ronnie Hurst fired out a pass from the boards that Bill Tyskko deflected into his own net for the Islanders' fourth goal. Hurst was credited with the goal.

Six minutes later Holdaway and Clements raced over the Sydney line with only Don Whelan to beat. Holdaway attempted to pass but Whelan intercepted. However, Holdaway picked up the rebound off Whelan's stick and raced into the clear to score on a 10-foot shot.
