New Club Control Method Draws Liberal Party Fire

The government's planned move to impose stricter control over clubs licensed to sell liquor in the province came under fire last night by delegates attending the annual meeting of the Fifth District Queens Liberal Association.

Sparking the discussion was a resolution introduced by V. MacLachlan, Charlottetown, which called on the government to re-examine its "club before the club" policy of planning new liquor licenses and appointing inspectors to enforce the regulations "long after the clubs have been in operation."

C.M. Maclean, who was Liberal candidate for Queens in the last federal election, asked why it should be necessary to increase prices on liquor purchased by clubs to pay for the inspectors' salaries. "Isn't there an inspector now?" he asked.

"There's been one for four years," Provincial Liberal Leader A.W. Matheson said.

"HIDDEN ONE"

"If he's there, he's a hidden one," said Mr. Maclean. He went on to say, "I think inspection is needed, but I'm against the extra charge. It's costly enough to drink now. It's not need policing, they should pay the cost of inspection through the cost of a license. If the license is \$10 now, jack it up to \$200 to pay for an inspector."

Mr. Matheson said he concurred with the idea of a high license fee but pointed out that certain clubs "look after their members very well now and should be treated differently."

Pointing out that the Charlottetown branch of the Liberal League has about 1,250 members, Lloyd MacNevin, Charlottetown, said "I can tell you that now those 1,250 members are against the government in this matter and this could mean a lot of votes may be swung our way."

ELECTION ISSUE?

John P. Nicholson, Charlottetown, said it should be considered whether or not the Liberal party is prepared to endorse a complete revision of the liquor laws. "It could be an election issue," he said.

One delegate said "if we're going to touch it, let's hit hard. But first let's find out where we stand."

Mr. Nicholson asked what position the Liberal opposition

Magistrate Upholds Charge Of Hunting Without Licence

GEORGETOWN — Convicted were given adjournments until Nov. 13 for judgment.

The offences were reported to have taken place on Halloween night.

STORE WINDOWS

The same two accused were also charged with a second offence of damaging property, on which no election of plea was taken from either man. The cases were adjourned to Nov. 13.

TWO DISTRICTS

Mr. Nicholson submitted a resolution which was approved, calling on federal authorities to do away with the dual constituency of Queens, dividing it into two electoral districts. Another resolution which was approved "declared the government guilty of wasteful extravagance and conduct in that it deprived home owners of essential accommodation, suffered loss of income to landlords, and most serious of all, deprived Charlottetown of needed revenue." The resolution referred to the bazing of homes on the site of the proposed provincial government office building on Rochford Street, between Kent and Fitzroy streets.

Giardello Signs To Meet Tigger In Peace

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — With settler fighter making any predictions except to say they would win, world middleweight champion Dick Tiger and Joey Giardello signed a contract for a title fight in Atlantic City, N.J., on Wednesday night.

"I'm not Cassius Clay," said Tiger. "I don't make predictions. I just fight."

Giardello also refused to give any word that the fight would end.

"I'm gonna win," he said. "I'll just try to make it go less than 15 rounds."

The signing was for the benefit of the public. Tiger's representatives had previously signed a contract calling for Tiger, of Nigeria, to receive 47 1/2 per cent of the gate and Giardello, of Philadelphia, to get 15 per cent.

The fighters met twice in 1959 once in Chicago and once in Cleveland, with each winning a split decision.
