Charlottetown Milling Company's Baking Contest for Wives

THREE CASH PRIZES AND BAG OF GOLD BOND FLOUR FOR BEST BREAD

The Charlottetown Milling Company will hold a baking contest for the housewives of Charlottetown, and are offering substantial cash prizes and a bag of flour for competition.

The contest will start right away, but all entries must be in not later than 10 a. m. on the morning of the 28th instant in the Market Building. The particulars of the Contest are as follows:

Any housewife, woman or girl in the City may compete.

All entries will be received at the Market Building on the morning of June 28th when judging will take place.

Each competitor will be required to bring one loaf of bread baked from Gold Bond Flour, and be asked to sign a certificate to that effect, stating also from whom the flour was purchased.

The competitor's name and number will be entered in a book by the Secretary, but the name will not appear on the bread to be judged.

or bad form, but its effect upon it is "luck or fortune is extremely doubtful." That it is "unlikely to pass under a ladder as is very commonly supposed depends upon circumstances. If the painter at the top happens to spill the contents of his paint pot at the moment, or if the pedestrian happens to knock the ladder from under the painter one or other or both the actors in the drama may meet with a mishap. But with due care on the part of all concerned the pedestrian may pass unharmed as thousands have done.

Goethe has told that "superstition is the poetry of life. It is inherent in man's nature and when we think it wholly eradicated it takes refuge in the strangest holes and corners whence it peeps out all at once as soon as it can do so with safety." But all such superstitions as tend to alarm our fears need, lessly are harmful and there are many such. We are perhaps less superstitious than our fathers and much less so than the ancients. We do not believe as did the great and wise Aristotle that "sneezing between noon and midnight is good, but from midnight to morning is unlucky." But we have still enough of delusions that have been handed down to us to justify each in asking himself: "Am I superstitious?"

If Sir Edmund Had Come to Dundas?

pliment the junior said he did not wish to go where he would be forgotten.

Verily, a wise head on young shoulders.

After he had become accountant at Hamilton the Bank of Hamilton was started, and the manager of the new bank offered Walker the position of his assistant, with a much larger salary than he was then receiving. Again the future president declined what seemed to be a big step forward in his banking career. "I have great faith in my own bank," the young accountant said, "and having put my hand to another plough, I do not wish to take it off." As a reward for his loyalty his salary was increased and he was sent to Toronto as chief accountant. He remained there for only seven or eight months, being sent to New York as junior agent in 1873.

The Tale of a Cheque.

An incident in Sir Edmund's career in the American metropolis is worthy of record. From 1868 to 1873 had been a time of great expansion in business in both Europe and America, and the Canadian Bank of Commerce had opened in New York in 1872. Trouble had begun in Vienna, and in September of that year New York, with the failure of Jay Cooke and Company, Walker's duties were those of an accountant. He had to carry out the transactions entered into by the senior agents, but he also had charge of all their loans of gold against currency and the keeping up of the margin thereon.

All of the big banking houses which had borrowed gold from the Canadian bank, and the junior agent's business was to manage so that they escaped loss. Walker got what was probably the last cheque that was certified of a great banking house which called the messenger on the fall for margin got the cheque, drawn of course, on a clearing-house bank, but on going to get it certified the bank refused and the messenger hurried to Mr. Walker with the information. Walker went to the private office of the banker and told him, expecting only to hear that he had failed. He, however, took Walker to the bank, and after he had conversed with the cashier the cheque was certified. An hour later the house had failed.

Winning His Spurs.

After two years in New York Edmund Walker was sent to Windsor, Ontario, as branch manager. The Canadian banks were heavily interested in lumber, and the Canadian Bank of Commerce had become entangled in a group of operators, another Canadian bank having about the same interest in other members of the same group. Walker worked hard for three years to relieve the situation—and won his spurs. His bank lost only a marginal sum, while the other bank made a loss which was one of the largest known in Canadian banking at the time.

In 1880 he was appointed inspector, with one clerk. The bank had then 30 branches in Ontario and offices in Montreal, New York and Chicago. During the year Walker prepared the first printed regulations of the bank and the first real cipher code. The scientific code-maker was then unknown, and the inspector obtained the aid of Mr. Dwight, the father of Canadian telegraphy. Before Mr. Walker had completed the inspection of all the branches he was appointed manager at Hamilton. Six months later he was back in New York, this time as
