Spider-Like Creature Found High Above Antarctic Icecap

WASHINGTON (AP)—Scientists have found a tiny, spider-like creature living in a miniature "garden" high above a desolate Antarctic icecap only 300 miles from the South Pole. The National Science Foundation, reporting this, said the discovery represents the southernmost point at which "any animal life is known to exist."

It may help solve some of the great riddles about the early history of the Antarctic continent, the foundation said.

The creature, tentatively identified as a mite, is pink in color and about one one-hundredth of an inch long.

It was found living among

microscopic algae and fungi in the soil of the Queen Maud Mountain range. A miniature oasis there, high above the ice, provided "a little world of warmth, greenery and water," the foundation said. The ground was covered by simple plants called lichens.

Biologist Keith A. J. Wise of Hawaii's Bishop Museum, one of a science foundation team of scientists surveying the insect and mite population of Antarctica, collected the mite at a point more than 100 miles closer to the South Pole than insects had previously been found.

Northland Has Worst Winter For 30 Years

EDMONTON (CP)—Northern Canada is experiencing its worst winter in 30 years, veteran trapper William McDiarmid said here.

The 45-year-old trapper said in an interview most wild animals are as "thin as fence rails." He said birds "are dying by the hundreds."

It could be a disastrous winter for trappers, he said, because the cold weather has caused wildlife to burrow in the snow to seek warmth and moose and caribou herds to band together.

"I believe we're having the worst winter since 1933-34," he said. A resident of the north most of his life, Mr. McDiarmid—Trapper Bill to his friends—said he lost three sled dogs within 90 minutes recently when temperatures plunged past 60 below.

"Their lungs froze up and there was nothing I could do to save them."

He told of camping out for five days and four nights in temperatures as low as 65 below.

"My big Arctic sleeping bag just wasn't warm enough. The flames from my campfire caused frost to settle on tree trunks as high as five to six feet."

Before the severe cold hit, he said he was bagging up to 14 martens a week on his large trapline in an area about 110 miles east of Watson Lake, 800 miles northwest of Edmonton.

He said his traps yielded only three martens and a mink in six weeks after the frigid weather took over.

Square Deal For Quebecers Is Urged In Business Field

MONTREAL (CP)—A French-speaking Quebecer should have the right to job-hunting in his own language.

If the company uses psychology tests, the questioning should take into account the applicant's cultural background.

If he lands the job, there should be booklets in French as well as English telling him about staff benefits and company policy.

But if he's ambitious, with his eye on the executive's penthouse—he would be wise to start brushing up on his English.

These were points made here at a conference sponsored by the Canadian management centre of the American Management Association on the question of doing business profitably in Quebec.

The call for a square deal for Quebecers in corporate employment offices was made by Ray Goyette of Montreal, Northern Electric Company Limited assistant superintendent of personnel services.

"Self-evident a need though it might appear, I would like to stress the importance of having employment interviews conducted in either English or French according to the wishes of the applicant," he said.

SHOULD BE IN BOTH

"Needless to say that the application for employment forms, as the basic working document in this process, should be available in both languages.

"The induction procedure which follows the hiring of a new employee should also, of necessity, be carried out in the language of the new employee."

But, Mr. Goyette said, there is no doubt English will continue as the dominant language in most large concerns in Quebec.

"It will therefore continue to be a necessity for the French-speaking employee to be more than competent in the English language, this, not only in view of the fact that we are operating principally in the North American continent, but also if he is to aspire to senior management positions."

U.S. Gov't Has New Look At Canal Plan

MONTREAL, Que. (CP)—The United States government is having another look at a proposal, already shelved, to build a new canal downstream from Buffalo, N.Y., to handle an expected heavy increase in Great Lakes shipping within the next 20 years.

Brig-Gen. Roy T. Dodge of the U.S. Corps of Engineers said here the U.S. is "more than just toying with the idea" of a canal next to the present Welland Canal system.

He said it would be required by 1980 or 1985 because, by then, traffic on the Welland, now undergoing a twinning project, will be saturated.

He spoke at a panel discussion held in connection with the joint convention of the Dominion Marine Association and the Lake Carriers Association, a U.S. organization.

Earlier, George Bata, vice-president of Upper Lakes Shipping Limited of Toronto, said a new canal "would not be such a crazy idea" because of the continuing growth of size, weight and length of lake carriers.

Pierre Camu, vice-president of the St. Lawrence Seaway, said two Canadian experts are working on a study that may ultimately lead to a longer seaway navigation season.

The study, headed by J. Ross McKay of the University of British Columbia, is attempting to establish the vital relationship of heat exchanges between air and water temperatures. It is expected to take a year to complete.

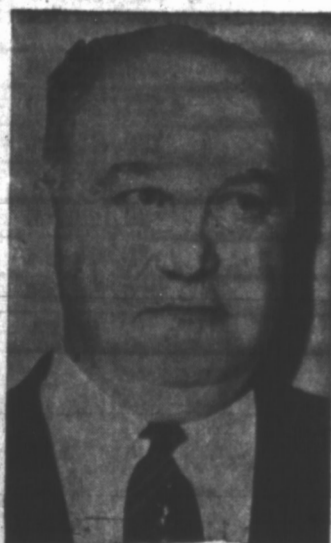

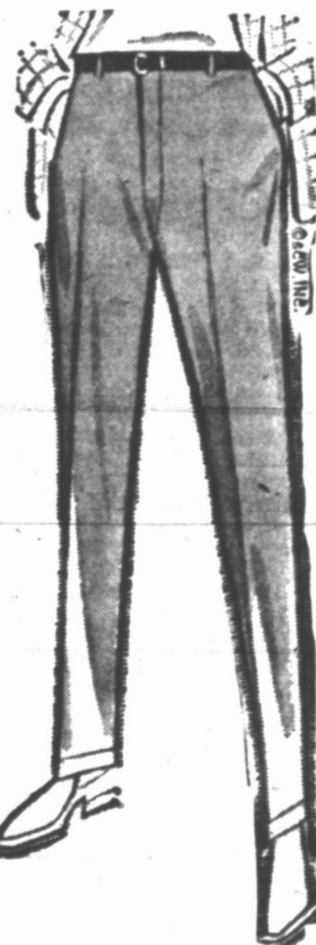

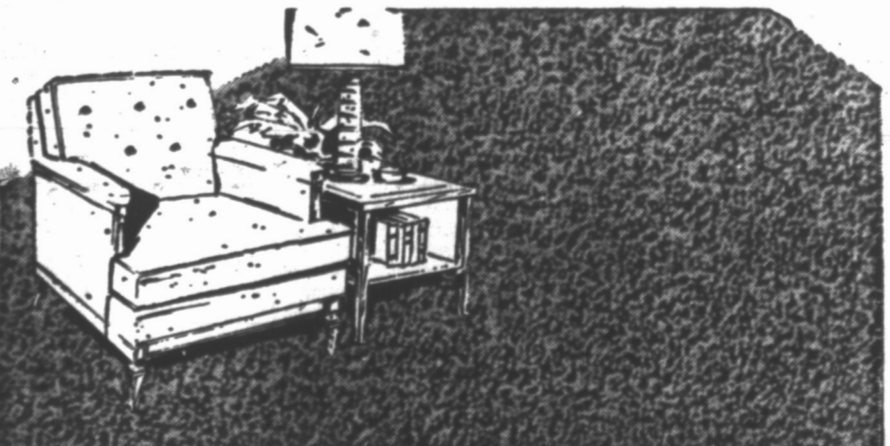
