Delvecchio's Goal Gives Red Wings 3-2 Victory

BOSTON (AP)—Detroit's fast-moving Red Wings rallied on goals by Gordie Howe and Alex Delvecchio in a 62-second span at the end of the middle period Thursday night for a 3-2 National Hockey League victory over Boston Bruins.

The victory was the Wings' fourth straight, but cost their rookie goalie, Glenn Hall, his shut-out string. A goal by the Bruins' Marcel Bonin, who got both Boston tallies, at 17:39 of the first period ended Hall's fine record at 198 minutes, 10 seconds.

SOLO EFFORT FOR HOWE Detroit was trailing 2-1 late in the second period when the brilliant Howe skated nearly the length of the ice, strong-armed his way past Ed Panagabko, who was clutching on to him, and angled a short blast behind Bruin goaltender Terry Sawchuk.

Normie Kwong Is Voted Canada's Top '55 Athlete

By JACK SULLIVAN Canadian Press Staff Writer TORONTO (CP)—Normie Kwong one of the finest backfielders in professional football is Canada's outstanding male athlete of 1955.

The country's sports editors and sportscasters put the tag on the 26-year-old Edmonton Eskimo half-year-end sports poll announced Thursday night. Rich Ferguson, Toronto miler who headed the 1954 poll, was shunted to the bottom of the list of 45 athletes mentioned. Ferguson received only one vote.

Asked to name the three outstanding Canadian athletes in order, more than one-third of the selectors put Kwong at the head of their list. Based on three points for first choice, two for second and one for third, Kwong's point-total was 145, far ahead of second-choice Cliff Lumsdon, Toronto long-distance swimmer who polled 90 points.

PARKER THIRD Jackie Parker, the gangling, shuffle-footed boy from Mississippi, who led Eskimos to their 34-19 Grey Cup victory over Montreal Alouettes last month, was third with 77 points. Fourth was Montreal Canadian's Jean Beliveau with 72.

From here it wasn't even a race. Selectors practically ran the full gamut of sports, covering the top in football, hockey, swimming, golf, boxing, weight-lifting, track and field, tennis, curling, fencing, skiing, baseball, racing and rifle shooting.

peared in five cup finals from 1928 to 1944. Ferguson hit his peak in 1954 with a blistering 4:04.6 mile in the British Empire Games at Vancouver, the fastest a Canadian has ever run the distance, but he failed to approach this mark in 1955 competing and retired from the track. Lumsdon hit the sport pages last Sept. 9 when he plunged into icy Lake Ontario with 29 others, including the world's leading distance swimmers, and was the only one to finish the 32-mile grudge for a \$15,000 first prize. Water temperatures ranged from 54 to 60 degrees and a few hours after the start Lumsdon was the only one on the course off Toronto's lake-front.

Parker, an excellent deceiver in Edmonton's split-T formation, almost dived the Als out of their uniforms with his deceptive ball handling in Eskimos' second successive cup triumph. He was outstanding on offence and defence.

THE VOTERS FROM Newfoundland to British Columbia looked over the record of the Calgary-born Kwong in Western Interprovincial Football Union and Grey Cup play this year and made him their solid No. 1 choice. They had plenty to go on.

HE SET FOUR WIFU RUSHING records during the season, was chosen as offensive back on the CP all-star team and barged over for two touchdowns in the cup final, his fifth appearance in the autumn classic. At the end of the season writers in the eastern and western football cities named him the outstanding Canadian player of the year.
