

Local and Other Items.

EARLY.—A ripe strawberry was picked at Southport yesterday.

L. O. O. F.—St. Lawrence Lodge meets at 8 o'clock to-night.

THE STYLE.—This favorite fashion paper for June is at the Diamond Bookstore.

SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—Meeting of Victoria Division this evening. A full attendance is requested.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—A sailor tumbled into the dock at Peake's No. 3 wharf late on Saturday night, and narrowly escaped being drowned.

RELIGIOUS.—At last evening's service in the Methodist Brick Church, a number of new members were admitted in the customary manner by the pastor, Rev. John Read.

ADDITIONS TO CHURCH.—In the Second Methodist Church last evening, one adult received the Sacrament of Baptism, and nine additional members were received into full connection.

FUNERAL NOTICE.—The remains of the late Thomas C. Bell will arrive by to-morrow (Tuesday) evening's express from Summerside. On arrival the funeral will proceed to the People's Cemetery.

REGATTA.—At a meeting of the Regatta Committee held on Friday last, it was decided to have races for sail and row boats at Charlottetown, on Wednesday, 26th June next.

BIG PRIZE.—A clerk named Fanteau, in the gas company at Montreal, has received a telegram informing him that he has drawn a \$5,000 prize in the Louisiana State lottery. He paid \$2 for the ticket, and is happy.

SUIT FOR DAMAGES.—The owners of the ship Vandalia have entered a suit in the English courts against the owners of the steamship Duke of Buccleuch to recover damages for loss of the Vandalia. Geo. F. Smith will stay in England for some time to watch the suit. The case will come up for trial shortly.

GOOD WORK.—Prince street ferry wharf has lately been widened and otherwise improved, and now ranks with the best wharves in the Province. An addition of ten feet, extending the entire length of the wharf, has been made, and a new platform, four feet in width, put down. The work has been well done, and the material used is of the best quality. We congratulate Mr. Bentley and the contractor, Mr. John King.

SALMON EGGS.—Alex. Mowat, the superintendent of the Restigouche, N. B., hatchery, has taken from the Restigouche and placed in the Miramichi hatchery 50,000 salmon eggs, and to the establishment at Grand Falls, N. B., 150,000. Notwithstanding the delicate work of removing eggs at this season of the year, Mr. Mowat says they were laid down in their hatcheries in perfect condition.

THE RECENT COLLISION.—A private letter from Captain Murchison to Captain R. McMillan is to the effect that the statement made by Mr. Gerrard and telegraphed THE EXAMINER on Friday, is, to a certain extent, incorrect. It is not true, as stated, that the William proceeded on her way without rendering any assistance to the damaged schooner. So soon as the Captain saw what had been done, he stopped the steamer and lowered a boat, which picked up the two men and put them on board a boat from the shore.

STEAMERS' MOVEMENTS.—The steamer M. A. Starr arrived at this port about seven o'clock on Saturday evening. She carried an inward cargo of general merchandise. She sailed on return trip at three o'clock on Sunday morning with a full cargo of lobsters, etc. The steamer Bonavista arrived from Montreal at five o'clock this morning with a general cargo. Col. Snow and Mr. and Mrs. McLellan will be the passengers for this port. She sailed again this afternoon. The steamer Coila arrived at Boston yesterday with deck cargo and everything all right.

THEY USED BOILING WATER.—A Dublin despatch says that the work of evicting tenants was continued on the Olphert estate on the Queen's Birthday. The evictors met with a desperate resistance, and during the struggle Inspector Duff was badly wounded. The tenants erected barricades around the house and from behind these defences hurled stones and other missiles at the attacking party. Boiling water was thrown upon the evictors, and a number of policemen and bailiffs were badly scalded. The police arrested fourteen persons.

OLD ABDALLAH AGAIN.—The Cultivator says that the fastest mile yet made at Beacon Park this season was that of Bijou, 2.25, driven by Frank Wallingford in 2.30. This is good for so early in the season. The same paper says: Mr. Hicks gave his second "matinee" of the season on Tuesday afternoon, and it was successful, both in the quality of sport furnished and in the attendance. The races were all half mile heats, and some surprisingly fast time was made for this early in the season. In the free-for-all Aristomont won the first and third in 1.10, 1.12, and trotted the second dead with Bijou in 1.10. In the fourth heat old Bijou came grandly, and won in 1.09, when the race was carried over until the next day. It is pleasing to learn that this speedy son of the "Old Reliable" is doing such good work.

SYMPATHY.—The last Boston Pilot publishes the following letter from King Kalakaua, of the Sandwich Islands, to Mr. James Jeffrey Roche in connection with the sad loss of his brother, Mr. John Roche, at Samoa, several months ago:—

"IOLANA PALACE, OFFICE OF HIS MAJESTY'S CHAMBERLAIN, HONOLULU, H. I., April 19, 1889.

Mr. James Jeffrey Roche:

DEAR SIR,—His Majesty the King learnt with sincere regret the sad intelligence of the death of your brother, Mr. John Roche, who was Pay Clerk on board the lost U. S. S. Vandalia, at the time of the terrible hurricane at Samoa. I am commanded by His Majesty to convey to you the expression of the deep sense of sympathy he entertains for you in your bereavement.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Senator Ryan Dead.

MONTRÉAL, May 26.

Hon. Thomas Ryan died this morning aged 85. He was a member of the Legislative Council up to Confederation, when he was raised to the Canadian Senate. Senator Ryan was chairman of the delegates from British North America to the Detroit Convention when Hon. Joseph Howe made his famous speech.

Revising the Voters Lists.

OTTAWA, May 26.

A circular has been sent to revising officers instructing them to proceed with their work of revising at as early a date next month as possible. The circular contains official instructions intended to enable revisors to avoid the misunderstandings which arose in connection with the first revision.

The Jesuits Affair Again.

QUÉBEC, May 26.

At the last meeting of the Protestant section of the Council of Public Instruction a resolution was adopted protesting against the local government disposing of portions of the Jesuits estates for other purposes than those of education. A resolution refusing acceptance of the \$60,000 was voted down.

Exempt from the Rule.

OTTAWA, May 26.

An Order in Council has been passed exempting from the Canadian rules and regulations for 12 months, boilers constructed in the United Kingdom according to the rules of the Imperial Board of Trade or through Lloyds, upon the production of satisfactory evidence.

News From Halifax.

HALIFAX, May 26.

The Polynesian's passengers and mails have arrived here and will be despatched on the Allan steamer Caspian to-morrow. A dense fog has enveloped the Newfoundland coast for some days, and the steamer Peruvian, due there Thursday, has not yet been reported.

Dr. Cronin's Funeral.

CHICAGO, May 26.

The funeral of Dr. P. H. Cronin took place to-day. Immense crowds attended the High Requiem Mass at the cathedral. There were 7,170 men in the funeral procession. The body was deposited in the public vault at Calvary Cemetery.

The Total Receipts.

OTTAWA, May 26.

Receipts from United States fishermen for licenses granted under the *modus vivendi* this spring amount to over double the total receipts during the whole of last season.

Man-of-War Ashore.

LONDON, May 26.

The British man-of-war Surprise was run ashore at Syracuse yesterday after colliding with and burning the steamer Nesta. The man-of-war is full of water.
