July 1, 1968, would involve little saving.

Only Saskatchewan would appear ready to benefit by next July 1 and the federal share of per-capita payments towards its plan would have totalled about \$8,250,000 in 1967-68.

Mr. Sharp said provincial pleas for a greater share of tax revenues will be turned down this year. But he has little precedent for making any reduction in the existing over-all level of payments.

One specific reduction will occur in forestry spending, where shared-cost programs with the provinces will be allowed to expire next March, saving \$12,500,000.

Mr. Sharp also mentioned the cancellation of the winter housing program, which had cost Ottawa about \$19,000,000 a year for the last three years.

Mr. Sharp also promised "more restraint in the rate of increase" for federal spending on research.

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics estimated that federal spending in all fields of research in 1955-56 totalled \$395,000,000.

The dollar difference this year will make it difficult to determine.

Two Ministers Seen Possible As Successors To Verwoerd

Justice Minister John Vorster and Transport Minister Ben Schoeman of South Africa—two men with different personalities and political backgrounds—have emerged as possible successors to assassinated Premier Hendrik Verwoerd.

As justice minister, Vorster has acquired an international reputation as the stern enforcer of his government's philosophy of apartheid (racial separation).

As transport minister, Schoeman has devoted himself energetically to ensuring that the nation's transport systems function effectively. He has not played a major role in public in the government's racial policies.

But, like Vorster, he is a firm supporter of apartheid.

Vorster is a militant anti-Communist who is believed to be a more extreme segregationist than was Verwoerd.

He has sweeping powers of detention and house arrest and has imposed restrictions on 450

SILENCE OPPOSITION

Vorster also has issued a list of persons whose utterances may not be published in South Africa, another provision of the Suppression of Communism Act.

Schoeman, who started his working life as a railway fireman, outlined his philosophy and his thoughts about South Africa's future in a speech at Johannesburg in 1957.

He warned South Africans of the threat of black nationalists and of white liberals, who wanted to give political power to Africans.

"If we want to challenge this danger which threatens our continued existence," Schoeman said, "there must be the greatest measure of white unity—justice and fairness to the non-white but determination, inexorable and decisiveness as regards the maintenance of the supremacy of the white man in South Africa."

During a Second World War, both men were strongly opposed to South Africa joining the side of the Allies.

Schoeman told the National party congress in 1940 that "the whole future of Afrikaners (former Dutch immigrants) is dependent on a German victory."

He later took the position that South Africa should establish an independent republic by negotiation with a victorious Germany.

Bond Issue Will Carry New Feature

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada Savings Bonds will carry a unique "double your money" feature with the new centennial series going on sale next month, it was announced here.

The bond buyer can double his original investment if he waits until maturity in 1979 to cash the bond and coupons.

The issue also provides the highest average yield in the 21-year history of the program.

In a prepared statement, Finance Minister Sharp said the series retains all the traditional features of Canada Savings Bonds "while offering to the investor the best terms of any series to date."

Purchases of Canada Savings Bonds already run to about \$1,000,000,000 a year but the federal government is hoping to build up personal savings even further as an anti-inflationary measure.

Opening lead—six of hearts. You have to do a certain amount of guessing in bridge, because that is the nature of the game, but you are expected to guess right far more often than you guess wrong.

Most so-called guesses in the play are resolved by following what is called the percentage play. There is no guarantee that percentage play will succeed; it is merely that the odds favor it, because, over a long period of time, it will probably do better than any other play.

For example, suppose you're declarer at three notrump and West leads the six of hearts.

produce a feature providing three compound interest certificates in addition to annual interest coupons over the 13-year life of the bonds.

INCREASE IN STAGES

The certificates come into effect in stages during the life of the bond if the annual coupons up to each stage (are not cashed. The cumulative total of coupons and certificates is to add \$50 in total interest to a \$50 bond at maturity, \$100 to a \$100 bond and so on.

Dated Nov. 1, 1966, the new bonds provide an average yield of 5.48 per cent a year if held to maturity. Interest is payable annually and begins at five per cent for each of the first four years, 5 1/2 per cent for each of the next three years, 5 3/4 per cent in the eighth year and six per cent for each of the final five years.

As usual, the bonds can be cashed at any time at any bank in Canada for their full face value plus earned interest. The annual interest coupons can be cashed as they become due, but this will forfeit the holder's entitlement to the compound interest certificates.

The centennial series will go on sale Oct. 3.
