Little Girl In S' Side Loses Life In Accident At Swing

Five-year-old Carol Ann Gallant, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Octave Gallant, 375 First Street, Summerside, was found by playmates hanging dead with a rope swing entwined around her neck yesterday afternoon a short distance from her home.

Only daughter, in a family of five children, the child had apparently been playing alone and had visited the location of a two rope swing close beside a saw mill on the harbor side of Water Street across from Muttart's Service Station.

The child's head could have reached the rope noose made by the twisted rope, only by standing on a pile of logs or an overturned boat which was on either side of the swing, and it was presumed that she slipped while trying to get onto the swing and was unable to obtain a footing on any object.

As far as could be learned last evening no one saw the little girl around the swings until two other children, Brenda Walsh and Charlotte Perry, chanced to be in the area and discovered her hanging from the rope.

One of the girls, 7-year-old Brenda Walsh, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Walsh, ran for her father at their nearby home. Mr. Walsh quickly removed the

rope from the neck of the little Gallant child and called Norman Perry who was working in his saw mill beside the swing area, which, because of a high board fence, was hidden from view of the street, the mill, or any of the homes in the area.

Together, the two men carried the child to her home, and then, in hope, rushed her to hospital in a passing vehicle owned by Timmie Arsenault. When examined by a doctor at the hospital the little girl was found to be dead.

Coroner Dr. W.E. Callaghan was called, and after preliminary investigation by Chief of Police R. White and members of the Summerside Police Department, it was considered that death was accidental and that an inquest would not be necessary.

Mr. Octave Gallant, father of the child, is employed at R.C.A.F. Station Summerside.

In addition to her parents, Carol Ann is survived by brothers Octave, 8; Albert, 7; Eddie, 6; and an infant brother Ronnie.

Transferred last evening from the Compton Funeral Home to her late residence, the funeral will be held Sunday afternoon at St. Paul's Church for service at 3 p.m. with burial in St. Paul's Cemetery.
