THE SCOTT ACT PETITION.—We understand that the petition for the revocation of the Order in Council bringing into force the Scott Act in Charlottetown, was lodged in the Registry Office to-day. This petition is signed by over six hundred electors, among whom we observe lawyers, doctors, a great many of the leading merchants of the city, clerks, editors, newspaper correspondents, besides mechanics, and gentlemen who have no "visible means of support." For the next ten days this petition will be open to public inspection, when those desirous of examining it may do so upon complying with the rules of the Registry Office.

THE Tea Party to be held to-morrow, Dominion Day, near Suffolk Station, St. Peter's Road, presents an opportunity for a rare day's enjoyment to the citizens of Charlottetown. The distance by rail from the city is 10 miles, and a train, at excursion rates, leaves Charlottetown at 12 o'clock, noon. The drive by road is only 7 miles. No part of Prince Edward Island possesses such romantic and picturesque features as the vicinity of Suffolk. A day spent on these charming hillsides, under the shade of the most beautiful of our native trees, with appetites satisfied by the good things which the ladies of St. Peter's Road know so well how to provide, must be an enjoyable one.

THERE was a panic in the Montreal and Toronto money markets on the 27th, causing a heavy decline in stocks. Federal bank stock, which was worth 160 at the beginning of June, fell to 120 in a few days, and on the 26th declined to 88. Other stocks followed suit and the Bank of Montreal fell from 181, on the 26th to 163; on 27th; Canadian Bank of Commerce 115 to 100; Merchants' Bank from 105 to 102; Richmond Ontario Navigation Co. from 55 to 50; and City Gas Co. from 176 to 163. The cause of trouble with the Federal Bank appears to be, so far as the bank is concerned, that too much stock is carried on its accounts, and margins are running out.

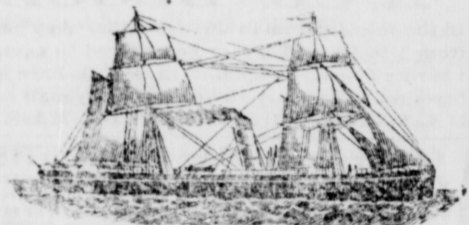
