Grand Parade Highlights Lobster Carnival Opening

Summerside's second annual Lobster Carnival was officially opened at the Summerside Raceway last evening by His Honor T. W. L. Prowse, who in declaring it open said that the fame of the first Carnival held last year had spread to many parts of Canada and he felt sure that the 1957 Carnival would be even more successful.
This success, he said, was due to the splendid community spirit of the Board of Trade and the various service clubs of the town. He also extended his congratulations to all those who worked to make it an outstanding success.
Hon. Angus MacLean, Minister of Fisheries, said that not only was the carnival a benefit to the community but to the fishing industry as well. He also extended hearty congratulations to all those connected with its production.
Other speakers who addressed the audience briefly were, Dr. Orville Phillips, M.P., Mayor Currie, C. R. MacLaggan, President of the Board of Trade.

Following the official opening the scheduled program was carried out consisting of horse racing a concert in the Civic Stadium by the St. Ann's Gaelic Band, dancing in the Stadium and a fireworks display to close the evening.
Although the skies were overcast during the afternoon the weather was ideal for the parade held at four o'clock. At six o'clock a slight downfall of rain threatened the evening's program but the skies cleared within a short time and the rest of the evening was ideal for enjoying the races and the midway.
HUGE PARADE
At three o'clock in the afternoon the many and varied floats which formed the high parade assembled at the eastern outskirts of the town under the direction of the parade marshal, Ben Champion. This year's parade was probably the largest ever seen in the town and for variety and originality, was somewhat reminiscent of the days when the famous Calathumplan parade was a feature attraction in Summerside.
Headed by two of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in scarlet tunics and mounted on motorcycles the parade was piped along Water Street to the music of St. Ann's Gaelic Band and also to the music of the Miscouche Band. Following the girls band was a vehicle which would be difficult to duplicate today anywhere, a 1924 Model T. Ford sedan, almost in as good condition as the day it left the factory.

Owned and driven by Fred Hamlin of Springfield, this sturdy veteran of a past generation carried Mayor Currie of Summerside, Mayor Leard of Borden, Mayor of Kensington and a representative of the Mayor of Alberton who was unable to attend.

MONTREAL (CP)—A 45-year-old tramp steamer, the Irene M., is to be sold at auction today for payment of debts.
