TAPIOCA RECIPES—
Some Excellent Dishes that are Cheap
and Easily Prepared.
Tapioca is one of the products of the
manioc or cassava plant, and is used
largely in the preparation of desserts,
and as a food for children and invalids.
It is inexpensive, light, wholesome and
nutritious, and a great variety of de-
licious dishes are prepared from it.
Cream—Soak in cold water for two
hours two tablespoonfuls of tapioca.
Drain it and beat it up with one scant
teaspoon of sugar, and stir it into one
cup of boiling milk. Let it boil half
an hour; then cool it slightly, and stir
in three well beaten eggs, any flavoring
desired. Serve cold with preserved or
stewed fruit.
Pudding—Soak one cupful of tapioca
several hours in tepid water; add one
quart of milk, four well beaten eggs,
two thirds of a cup of sugar and a pinch
of salt; three tablespoonfuls of grated
coconut; add the tapioca to the milk,
and put in a double boiler, or in a tin
bath set in a pan of hot water, and stir
until thick. Remove from the heat, and
add the yolks of the eggs and the
other ingredients; lastly the well beaten
whites of the eggs. Let it cool, and
when cold lay spoonfuls of jelly upon
the top. Serve cold.

Pudding—Equal quantities of rice and
tapioca, say three tablespoonfuls of
each, soak for a short time in a cup of
milk, four tablespoonfuls of sugar,
grated nutmeg to taste, a pinch of salt,
one quart of milk. Put all together
and bake in a slow oven for two
hours, stirring often during the first
hour.
Apple Pudding—One cup tapioca
soaked several hours in cold water, one
cup of sugar, a pinch of salt, one-half
nutmeg, grated. Slice apples into a
baking dish until two-thirds full; add
the other ingredients, with water enough
to cover. Put a cover over it and bake
slowly three or four hours. Serve either
hot or cold, as desired.

Blackberry Tapioca—One cupful
soaked 10 or 12 hours in cold water;
add one pint of hot water, and simmer
until clear; sweeten one quart of black-
berries and stir into the tapioca. Pour
into a deep dish and serve very cold,
with sugar and cream.
Jelly—Three quarters of a cupful
of tapioca, soak in a double
boiler, with one and a half pints of
water and a pinch of salt. When it
thickens, add two thirds of a glass of
apple, currant or lemon jelly and a
little sugar. Cook about half an hour,
or until the tapioca is clear. Put it in
a mold, and when perfectly cold, turn
it out. Serve with whipped cream or
soft custard.

Custard—Soak three large spoonfuls
of tapioca in one quart of water for
several hours. Boil one quart of milk
and stir in the soaked tapioca; boil about
10 minutes until it is clear. Beat yolks
of three eggs, one cup of sugar, one tea-
spoonful of vanilla or other flavoring,
and add gradually to the tapioca, boil
five minutes; pour into a dish and mix
in lightly the whites of the eggs beaten
to a stiff froth. Eat cold with sweetened
cream.

Blanc Manger—One cup of tapioca,
three cups of boiling milk, three table-
spoonfuls of white sugar, a pinch of
salt, any flavoring desired; soak the
tapioca several hours in a little cold
water; pour it into the boiling milk and
let it boil for about twenty minutes,
stirring it constantly; add sugar and
flavoring. Take it from the fire and
pour into molds. Serve cold.

Tapioca and Peach Pudding—One
large cupful of tapioca; soak in three
pints of cold water over night. In the
morning put in the double boiler and
cook until it looks clear; add one cup
of sugar and one dozen peaches pared and
cut in eighths; put in a buttered pud-
ding dish and bake one hour. Serve cold
with sugar and cream.

Fruit Dessert—Make a plain blanc
manger or jelly by boiling soaked tapioca
until clear in either milk or water; put
a layer of mixed preserved and candied
fruits in a glass dish, and when the
tapioca has cooled sufficiently, pour a
part of it over them; add more fruit
and the remainder of the tapioca. Serve
cold.

Soup—Two quarts of stock, one cup
of tapioca; let it boil for twenty min-
utes, stirring it frequently; one tea-
spoonful of sugar, one tablespoonful of
catsup, butter half the size of an egg,
half a teaspoon of milk; cool slightly and
stir in two well beaten eggs. It must not
be hot enough to curdle the eggs, but
should be smooth like cream.

Curious Properties of Spices.
The aroma of red cedar is said to be
fatal to house moths. The aroma of
black walnut leaves is fatal to fleas. It
is a matter of common observation that
persons engaged in the business of mak-
ing shingles out of odoriferous cypress
timber in malarial districts are rarely,
if ever, affected by malarial diseases,
and that persons engaged in distilling
turpentine do not suffer from either
malarial diseases or consumption. It is
said that when cholera was epidemic in
Memphis persons working in livery
stables were entirely exempt from it.
It is affirmed that since the destruction
of the clove trees on the island of Ter-
nate the colony has suffered from epi-
demies unknown before, and in times
when cholera has prevailed in London
and Paris those employed in the per-
fumery factories have escaped its ravages.

How to Broil in a Frying Pan.
When one has no means of broiling
over coals or under heat, the next best
thing is broiling in a pan. For example,
have a steak cut about an inch thick,
after making the frying pan very hot,
sprinkle in some fine salt and lay the
steak in the pan. Cook for two minutes,
then lift the steak up and sprinkle the
pan with salt; turn the steak and cook
for two minutes; cook the piece of meat
ten minutes in all, turning it every two
minutes; then put the meat on a hot
dish and season with salt and pepper.

TAPIOCA RECIPES—
Great Increase in the Haulage Power of
Horses.
Colonel Francis Vinton Greene has re-
cently published an address on the sub-
ject of good roads in the Butterfield
Practical Course at Union College. In
the course of his remarks he showed
that while Massachusetts annually ex-
pends \$66 a mile on roads outside of
cities, New Jersey \$41, and New York
\$29, the average expenditure in the
other States is much less. If it is only
\$18 a mile, this means an expenditure
throughout the country of \$23,000,000,
and much the larger part of this vast
sum is literally thrown away on roads
that are not only the cause of vexation
and discomfort to those who drive over
them, but that entail actual loss upon
those who are compelled to carry their
goods over them to the market or to
the railway stations.
The enormous waste made by bad
roads on our resources was estimated by
Colonel Greene, and his figures will not
be doubted by anyone who has paid any
attention to the subject. He said:
"It has been proved, not only by me-
chanical experiment, but by actual test,
that the same force which draws a ton
on a muddy earth road will draw
four tons on a hard macadam road. On
the improved roads of New Jersey loads
of four to five tons are habitually drawn
by a two horse team. This effects a
saving of fully three-fourths of the cost
of hauling to the station, and reduces
the cost of rail transportation from 30
cents to 7-1/2 cents per ton per mile.
This saving amounts to can be
reckoned at \$100,000,000 a year. The
New York Central Railroad carries
nearly 20,000,000 tons of way freight in
a year. If this is hauled only two mill
a ton, instead of the 20 cents per ton
now paid, it would mean a total
saving of \$2,000,000,000 a year.
In other words the question of roads
is a question of farming at a loss
or at a profit. And there is not a com-
munity in the thickly settled parts
of the country that cannot pro-
vide itself with thoroughly good high-
ways by attending to the road tax
for fifty or twenty years. Money bor-
rowed on 4 or 5 or 10 or 20 year terms
to be paid off from the annual road
taxes, would be sufficient for the work
in each case, with the exception of
what would involve little, if any, in a
taxation. The plan that is here sug-
gested has been tried in Iowa near
New York, and it is a noble one. It
is every bit as good as the plan that
has been tried in these communities
and has the sentiment in favor of spend-
ing money in this way.—The West-
ern.

pour into molds. Serve cold.

Tapioca and Peach Pudding—One
large cupful of tapioca; soak in three
pints of cold water over night. In the
morning put in the double boiler and
cook until it looks clear; add one cup
of sugar and one dozen peaches pared and
cut in eighths; put in a buttered pud-
ding dish and bake one hour. Serve cold
with sugar and cream.

Fruit Dessert—Make a plain blanc
manger or jelly by boiling soaked tapioca
until clear in either milk or water; put
a layer of mixed preserved and candied
fruits in a glass dish, and when the
tapioca has cooled sufficiently, pour a
part of it over them; add more fruit
and the remainder of the tapioca. Serve
cold.
