SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. FOR THE NORTHWEST. A Fine Body of Immigrants Coming. LONDON, March 25. The Allan Line steamer "Parisian" sails from Liverpool on Thursday for the St. Lawrence. She is the first mail boat of the summer arrangement. She carries the finest body of immigrants for Alberta, Assiniboia and Manitoba that ever left this country, including well-to-do farmers from the best agricultural districts of England and Scotland. The reports of the British farmers' delegates are doing much towards attracting attention to Canada's wonderful resources.

The Foster-Domville Recount. Judge Wedderburn Has No Jurisdiction. ST. JOHN, March 25. The Court in pursuance of adjournment made at the request of C. W. Weldon, Col. Domville's Counsel, opened at Hampton, King's County, yesterday, to hear the application for a recount in the Foster-Domville election. Mr. Weldon read an affidavit to show that notice had been served on Foster, but Dr. Barker, who appeared for the Finance Minister, contended that a telegraphic service was valueless, and that in any case adjournment in the first instance was illegal, therefore the judge had no jurisdiction now. Judge Wedderburn concurred in this view and dismissed the case.

A FUGITIVE FROM JUSTICE. Captured in Boston. BOSTON, March 25. James Elliot, alias Henry James, was arrested here yesterday. Elliot is a fugitive from justice. He was tried, convicted and sentenced to five years in the Dorchester Prison in New Brunswick, for setting a house on fire in Hubbard's Cove, Nova Scotia. After serving three years Elliot escaped. He is held awaiting instructions from the Canadian authorities.

THE HUNTINGDON ELECTION. No Political Significance. HUNTINGDON, Que., March 25. Scrivener's majority is 255. As Scrivener repudiated Laurier and Mercier, the result, as the Montreal Star puts it, has little or no political significance. The candidate having repudiated the most essential plank in the platform of his party, Huntingdon has not had an opportunity of declaring itself upon unrestricted reciprocity.

The Halifax Liquor Detectives. HALIFAX, March 25. Detectives Ross and Mackay, who have been sent to the Supreme Court for conspiracy in inducing liquor dealers to violate the law by selling them drinks, was before that court to-day. The Chief Justice charged in their favor, ridiculing the idea of their action being conspiracy.

News Notes. Mr. T. P. Cairnes, an employer of labor in Drogheda, has promised \$5,000 towards the erection of artisans' dwellings in that town. There is believed to be good reason for stating that the Irish Government will not exact payment of the forfeited bail given for the appearance of Messrs. O'Brien and Dillon. For pure-bred stock in the north of Scotland sold last year a total of \$41,763 was paid, or about £10,000 more than in the previous year. The number sold was 1803 head of polled and shorthorn cattle. Figaro is informed that one of the most important banks in London has received for safe keeping four chests containing papers belonging to Prince Bismarck. Two more chests are expected to follow, after which the Prince will himself go to London to complete his memoirs, and arrange for their publication.

GRECIAN ORATORY.—The Rev. J. Read lectured last evening before the Epworth League on "Grecian Eloquence." Mr. F. W. L. Moore presided. Mr. Read treated the subject somewhat fully and at considerable length, referring to the political and social condition of Greece at the time Socrates flourished. Examples were given of the wonderful oratorical triumphs of that prince of orators, and also many important hints respecting the cultivation of the voice and the rare accomplishment of good reading. The lecture was replete with instruction, highly interesting, and well delivered. On motion of Mr. J. T. Mellish seconded by Mr. R. Hertz, a vote of thanks was presented to the lecturer.
